

### NOW SHORTAGE OF CANDLES British Food Ministry Seeks Method by Which It May Be Enabled to. Regulate Supplies.

News is coming from many parts of the country that, the shortage of candles is increasing ewing to the fact first many people who did not use them before are new supplementing their gas and electric light rations by their use. It is becoming more clear every day that some means must be adopted to insure that householders in rural districts, where there is no ras or electricity, have an adequate supply of illuminants. Important national industries which cannot well be carried on without 'an adequate canile supply must also be protected. A scheme for controlling candle supplies is engaging the attention of the ministry of food.

During and since last winter there has been a candle shortuge. The oils and fats branch of the ministry of food within whose view this matter comes, have received numerous complaints from rural controlls and individuals of the difficulty of getting appplies and of retail prices going up by leaps und bounds. There is evidence of a new demand having sprung up within the ter's shortage and making a candle famine imminent .- Manchester Guard-
