### Obituary

FRED MASON

Yesterday evening Frederick Mason, the well known horse buyer, passed away following on a paralytic stroke on Tuesday. Mr. Mason had a slight stroke a couple of weeks ago, but he was about again as usual when the second laid him low. Mr. Mason was born near Harris's Corners sixty-seven years ago.

At the time of the passing of the Scott Act in Halton he was keeping hotel in Norval. When prohibition closed his hotel he was about cleaned out for he had bought the place only a few months before and after the passing of the Act the place would not sell for its mortgage. Mr. Mason, who had always been more or less identified with the horse business, came to Brampton and for many years was with Mr. D. T. Lowes. Fred had a great eye for a horse, especially hunters and saddle horses and his buying took him from one end of the province to the other and he was about as well known in Ontario as in Peel. For several years he had been doing but little "only picking up a good one occasionally." Mr. Mason was the youngest of a large family at one time well known in the Hornby section of Halton. Mr. Mason is survived by his widow and two brothers and one sister, William of Acton, Hiram and Mary of Chicago.—Brampton Banner
