

American Oil.

A famous British statesman, Lord Curson, declared that-the allies "floated to victory on a sea of oil." He might have said "on a sea of American oll." No less than four-fifths of the petroleum products used by the allies were furnished by America. At one time, before the shipping of American oil was properly organized, the armies in France had on hand less than one month's supply, forcing the general staff to make calculations of how they must retreat in case of a breakdown in the supply of gasoline. America. however, came herolcally to the rescue and saved the day. Chief credit for our titanic achievements in keeping the attied navies and armies going with oil was officially given A. C.
