Referring to the establishing of an office in Milton by the law firm of Messrs. G. W. Morley and C. W. Hamilton, the Clampton says: The office in town will be in charge of J. H. Pedley, of Toronto.

Obituary

JAMES HOOD

Death came suddenly to Mr. James Hood, one of Esquimaux's best known and most highly respected residents, on Monday morning last. Mr. Hood, who was at Mr. Alex Hume's, his son-in-law, had partaken of a hearty breakfast and appeared in his usual health when he left the house to go to the stable. He had only proceeded a few steps from the door when he was stricken and died in a few minutes. Deceased was a son of the late John Hood who came from Scotland and settled in Esquimaux. He was born in Stewarttown 78 years ago and had resided there all his life with the exception of seven years spent in Barrie and Rockwood. He was married 48 years ago to Miss Adeline Bailey, who with one daughter Mrs. Alex Hume, and one son J. D. Hood, survives. The late Mr. Hood was a good citizen and an honorable man, loved by his family and esteemed by all who knew him. In religion he was a Presbyterian and in politics a Conservative.

Remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown, on Monday, December 15th, the service being conducted by Rev. F. F. Cameron. The pall-bearers were W. Lawson, J. Appelle, Job Board, W. D. Johnston, Geo. B. Thompson and Goodson Appelle.


