**Obituary**

**BENJAMIN J. FORSTER**  
The remains of the late Benj. J. Forster who passed away at Killam, Alta., last week, were interred in Glenwilliams Cemetery on Monday afternoon, the service being conducted by Rev. W. L. Davidson of the Methodist Church.

The late Mr. Forster was born in Streetsville 80 years ago and was a resident of Glenwilliams for many years. Some 20 years ago he went west and has since resided at Killam, Alta. Deceased had been in poor health since about a year ago when he had the misfortune to fall and break his thigh. Besides his widow the following members of his family survive: Benj. J., Hydro Electrician, Georgetown; John in India; Joseph and Edward, at Killam, Alta.; Mrs. W. P. Byers, India; Mrs. Patterson, Victoria, B.C.; Mrs. A. Haines, Oshkosh, Wis. A son, David, was killed while fighting in France.
