The Norval Contest has been postponed indefinitely.

Contract Signed for Bridge
At their last meeting the county council awarded a contract to Norman McLeod, Ltd., to build a bridge, similar to that erected by them at Tansley, over the Sixteen Mile Creek, on the same road, Dundas Street. The contract has been signed by the officials and by the contractors, who are to be paid cost, plus ten per cent and who are required to complete the work next year. The work will be in charge of Jas. A. Bell, C.E., of St. Thomas, who will prepare plans and specifications. His estimate of the cost at \$110,000, of which it is expected that the Ontario Government will pay 60 per cent, the road having been accepted by it as a county provincial highway. There was a long discussion on the advisability of proceeding with the work next year. The reasons why it was decided to are: An option for a short time has been secured for nine iron girders from a demolished bridge on the Intercolonial Railway, same as those used in the Tansley bridge, but at a price 20 per cent lower than the former reduced price; a quantity of plant and material used at the Tansley bridge can be used on the new contract. Its value for use on the contract is about \$10,000, but if it were sold now it would sell as junk at a much lower figure. In the opinion of the Engineer the contractors having just finished the Tansley bridge, can erect the other, which is to be similar, more quickly and economically than any other firm.
The letting of the contract was carried by a vote of 9 to 5. The intention is to get as much material on the spot during the winter as possible, so that construction can begin with the opening of spring and continue steadily until completion.—Champion.
