

Fish Pientiful in Chile. Along the const of Chile, many sections of which are practically uninhabited at present, graves of the

aborigines are found in great num hers, and they invariably contain implements for sea fishing. From prehistoric times the coast of Chile has been noted for its diverse and extensive fisheries. The fishes are so plentiful that sea birds by the millions, feeding on them, are found along the coast, and the numerous guano islands indicate the great length of time the hirds frequented these waters. With methods similar to those used in other countries, the fishing industry could be revolutionized and established on a very large scale.
