Thompson—Elliott that leave be granted to introduce a By law to appoint Auditors for the year 1920 and that said By law be now read the first time. Carried.

Elliott—Thompson that the By law to appoint Auditors be now read the second and third times and passed and that the blanks be filled up with the names of R. C. McDougall and William Thompson and that they receive the sum of \$15 each for their services.—Carried.

McDowell—Thompson that leave be granted to introduce a By law to appoint a Sanitary Inspector and that said By law be now read the first time.—Carried.

Thompson—McDowell that the By law to appoint a sanitary inspector be now read the second and third times and passed and that the blanks be filled up with the name of John R. Smith.—Carried.

Elliott—McDowell that leave be granted to introduce a By law to appoint Assessors for the Township of Esqueving and that said By law be now read the first time.—Carried.

McDowell—Elliott that the By law to appoint Assessors for the Township of Esqueving for the year 1920 be now read the second and third times and that the blanks be filled up with the name of G. B. Thompson for Wards 1, 2 and 3, and Neil Gillies for Wards 4, 5 and 6 and that they receive the sum of \$100 each for their services.—Carried.

Matthew, Drug-gist, for fumigating supplies to December 29th 1919, \$30.80; also that the salary of Dr. McAllister be paid at the rate of \$75 per annum.—Carried.

Elliott—Thompson that the treasurer pay the following accounts, Clara Robertson the sum of \$2 refund dog tax, dog being registered before Court of Revision, Samuel McMaster \$2 dog tax he having no dog, Mrs. John Watkins \$2 refund she having no dog; Municipal World, Municipal supplies \$89.88, J. A. Tracy \$5 cts. express on game; Dr. J. A. McInven discharging No 6 Boardmore Crescent after Small-Pox case \$6; Robert Given for travelling Paper Mill hill \$70 yds at \$1.25 per yd and grading same \$485.00, John Bingham for gravel for Paper Mill hill, 870 yds at .25 \$217.50.—Carried.

Thompson—McDowell that the treasurer pay Wm. Ostrander for spreading gravel on Paper Mill hill 10 days at \$4.00 per day \$40, also that the Council accept the tender of F. M. Moore for printing at \$100.00.—Carried.

Hampshire—Thompson that the treasurer pay the following accounts: T. J. Leatham, Boardmore Crescent, Esqueving, for household supplies during two weeks quarantine for Small Pox, household consisting of 6 adults and 2 children \$60.—Carried.

Hampshire—McDowell that the treasurer pay A. J. Murray the sum of \$11.38 for taxes paid on property which was twice assessed and paid; Frank Murray \$2 for posting bill for Nomination day, J. A. Tracy \$5 for loose leaf Register for Birth, Marriages and Deaths; J. M. Moore (Georgetown Herald) of account for 1919 printing \$54.00.—Carried.

Hampshire—McDowell whereas the County Council of the County of Haldon at their last regular meeting, passed legislation committing the County to the construction of a new high level bridge on the Dundas Street, the cost of such structure is estimated to be \$125,000, and whereas the County of Haldon is already heavily involved, financially through debentures at ready issued for road and bridge construction.

And whereas when this legislation was passed there were no proper estimates or specifications before the said Council, the members of which had not sufficient time in which to consider a proposition involving a financial obligation of such magnitude.

It is hereby resolved, that the construction of said bridge be deferred until such estimates, plans and specifications are placed before the County representatives and due time be given to consider also such procedure, especially that of issuing debentures for such purposes be investigated as it is felt to be illegal to proceed in such a manner without a vote of the ratepayers having been taken, which we believe is according to legislation at present on the Statute Book of the Province of Ontario.—Carried.
