Baptist Anniversary

The anniversary services in the Baptist Church last Sunday were remarkably interesting and attracted large congregations in spite of the remarkably cold weather. Dr. Cline, the pastor, conducted the exercises and was assisted in the morning by Rev. Wray L. Davidson, and in the evening by Rev. John McColl, and Rev. B. F. Cameron, of the Presbyterian church.

Prof. H. S. Carr, B.D., the preacher for the day, is a young, ruddy rugged Scotchman, recently appointed Lecturer in Hebrew and Aramaic, and Old Testament Exegesis in McMaster University, Toronto, and this was his first appearance in Georgetown. His strong, sterling personality at once won the favor of his audience and his discourse, Indian, original, logical arrangement and exceptional fervor would satisfy the most exacting of "sermon tasters". In the morning he vindicated the belief in a benevolent all-wise Providence, speaking from Romans VIII: 28. "For we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them that are called according to his purpose." This is a text frequently perverted by mis-quotation. In recent years men have frequently called in question the thought of a benevolent, over-ruling God. Paul did not simply say that all things work together for good, but he affirmed that "we know" this to be true. He did not say that all things are good, but he did say that all things work together for good, like the various ingredients in a doctor's prescription. The people to whom all things work together for good are described according to what they are, and what they do; they are the called according to the divine purpose, and they love God.

In the evening Prof. Carr delivered a profoundly original and striking sermon from Psalm 130: 1: "Out of the depths have I cried unto Thee, O Lord." The Psalmist is to be thanked for not saying "The depths". We speak of various depths, such as the depths of our humanity, the profundities of our very natures. God is to be found when we try unto Him from the depths of our experience, the depths of our thought, the depths of our feeling. Such depths there are in every person, relating if not absolutely. And every man may effectually call upon God.

The church choir was in excellent form and rendered most acceptable services, and the choir-leader Mr. W. Horton and the organist, Miss M. McMaster, received congratulations and expressions of gratitude from all sides. Miss Ethel Witherspoon, contralto soloist of Toronto, delighted and inspired everyone by her selections, and the men quartet, comprising Messrs Horton, Mimms, Cole and MacDonald, was heard for the first time with very great satisfaction.

The congregation quite outdid itself in the free-will offering. The Finance Committee asked for \$150.00 and the people gave nearly one hundred and ninety dollars.

Own Your Home

\$150,000 for the Wage Earners of Georgetown to Build Homes

Georgetown, like other leading manufacturing town in the province, is short of houses. We have no doubt that if one hundred houses were available at the present time they would be occupied. One of the beneficial acts passed by the Union Government makes it easy for persons of limited means to own the houses they live in. A fund of \$25,000,000 was provided by the Federal Government which is loaned to the Provincial Administration, they in turn, advancing to the Municipalities such sums as may be required by the Housing Commissions, which deal directly with the people.

Georgetown has a Housing Commission, the members of which have got busy and secured \$120,000 for the use of those who desire to take advantage of this splendid opportunity to own a home of their own.

In a very short time the season for building will be open, and full advantage should be taken. Any person who has the deed for a \$500 lot can secure an amount up to \$8,000 to build his house. Repayment is to be made by monthly payments. All conditions can be ascertained by applying to the Commission.

The popularity of the scheme is established by the large number of municipalities availing themselves of its provisions. In all ninety-one municipalities are using the credits provided by the Dominion and Provincial Governments.

The following deputation waited on the Hon. Mr. Nixon, Provincial Secretary, at the parliament buildings at Toronto on Friday last, and completed arrangements in spite of the loan to Georgetown residents—Reeve Dale, Councillors, McMillan, Rush, McIntyre, Anthony, Bush, Clerk Heath; J. B. MacKenzie, J. A. Willoughby and W. F. Bradley, representatives of the Board of Trade.
