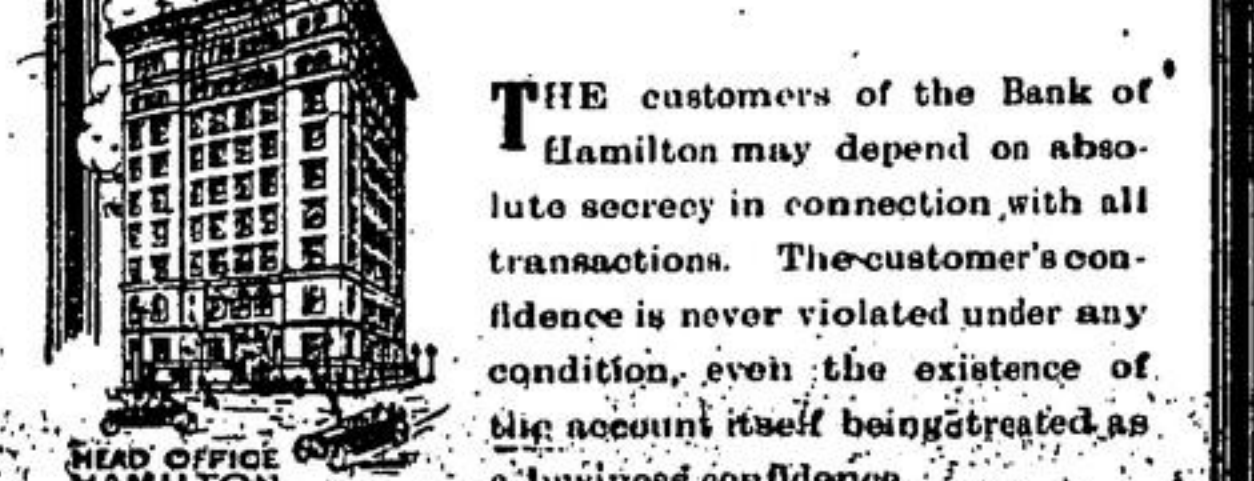

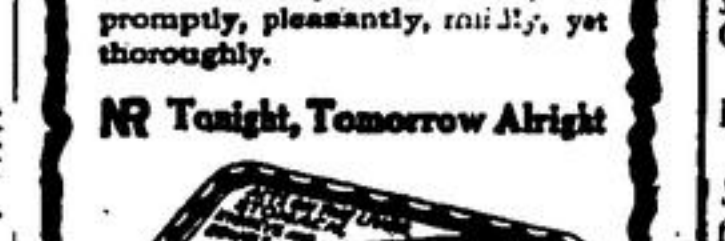

County Council

Milton, Jan. 27th, 1920.

The council met at 2 p.m. in accordance with Municipal Act, the Clerk in the chair.

The following gentlemen having filled certificates of election, took their seats:

Traffalgar—Reeve, W. H. Morden; Deputy Reeve, J. A. Johnstone, V. S.

Esqueving—Reeve, Jas. L. Standish; Deputy Reeve, John B. Elliott.

Nelson—Reeve, W. A. Irving; Deputy Reeve, Jas. B. Leonard.

Milton—Reeve, Edmund Syer; Deputy Reeve, Geo. Hillmer.

Burlington—Reeve, Wm. M. Bridgman; Deputy Reeve, B. W. Williamson.

Georgetown—Reeve, LeRoy Dale; Deputy Reeve, Geo. Barber.

Nominations for the office of Warden were made as follows:

By Mr. Bridgman, W. H. Morden.

By Mr. Johnson, Wm. M. Bridgman.

By Mr. Elliott, Jas. L. Standish.

Messrs. Bridgman and Standish withdrew in favor of Mr. Morden, who was declared elected, unanimously.

Mr. Morden made his declaration of office before His Honor Judge Elliott and took the chair. He thanked the council for the honor done him and outlined the business to be brought before the meeting and some, which would come up during the year.

Mr. Hillmer moved, seconded by Mr. Bridgman, that the following members of council be hereby appointed a committee to strike the standing committee for the current year: Messrs. Irving, Standish, Barber, Bridgman, Dale, Syer, Hillmer and the Warden.—Carried.

Mr. Irving moved, seconded by Mr. Williamson, that the report of the committee to strike the standing committee for the current year be and is hereby adopted.—Carried.

The minutes of the meeting of December 19th, 1919, were read.

Mr. Irving moved, seconded by Mr. Hillmer, that the minutes of the last county council be adopted as read.—Carried.

Communications were read as follows: Mrs. Geo. Havill, asking for grant to Halton Women's Institute, A. Warner, notice of meeting of Trustees' Section, Ontario Educational Association, A. G. Gower, "Sixth Road Commission," W. A. McLean, Deputy Minister of Highways, re meeting of Ontario Good Roads Association, Hospital for Sick Children, asking for grant, Jas. A. Bell, C. E. re bridge, Sixteen Mile Creek, and J. Brent, Noxon & Co., re bridge, also asking for maintenance of Halton pupils from Georgetown, Brampton and Streetville high schools, County Clerk, Dufferin, re good road subsidies, County Clerk, Essex, re dog tax and county roads.

Mr. Irving presented and read the first report of the standing committee on roads and bridges, Mr. Dale the first on special communications, Mr. Barber the first on printing, Mr. Syer the first on county buildings, Mr. Bridgman the first on editing, Mr. Standish the first on wood roads and special report on claims for damages of Hugh Black and Mrs. Leslie.

Mr. Irving moved, seconded by Mr. Williamson, that the report of the committee of the whole on reports of standing committees, considered and amended in committee of the whole, be adopted.—Carried.

Mr. Hillmer moved, seconded by Mr. Irving, that the report of the finance committee be adopted.—Carried.

Mr. Standish moved, seconded by Mr. Johnstone, that the Warden and Clerk be authorized to sign and submit to the Minister of Public Works and Highways of the Province of Ontario the petition of the Corporation of the County of Halton, Ont., showing that during the period January 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, there has been expended on the county highway system the sum of \$138,583.27, and requesting the statutory grants on that amount, as provided by the Act to Aid in the Improvement of Public Highways.—Carried.

Mr. Hillmer moved, seconded by Mr. Williamson, that when this council adjourns we meet again on Tuesday, January 27th, at 7:30 p.m.—Carried.

On motion the council adjourned.

Six Million Jews Are Facing Death

Starvation and disease cause innumerable suffering in Eastern Europe.

The hardships of this winter will mean death to thousands of Jews in Poland, unless outside aid intervenes at once according to Lieut. Shelton Wright of the American Red Cross Commission. He and recently returned to the United States after months of relief work in eastern Europe.

He painted a vivid picture of this half-starved people, clad in rags, who are now creeping back toward their devastated homes after months of refugee wandering, and dying of starvation and typhus along the roads, as they go.

"Outside starvation, numerous diseases, attributed to malnutrition and typhus have killed men and women and children like flies," he said. "I remember a family trying to live under a wagon by the roadside. The mother was dead under a tree a few yards away—the had been dead for days. The father was stretched upon the ground dying of typhus. He died that day. Under the wagon were two little children, both under five, sick with typhus. An older child sat stupidly beside them—a girl driven out of her mind."

Many of the people are driven to making "bread" out of leaves and bark, and "soup" out of grass and water. Lieutenant Wright reported. There was unspeakable joy among them when the American ships, loaded with relief supplies purchased with the funds raised by the American Jewish Relief Committee and other American Jewish agencies, and American and Canadian Red Cross supplies were unloaded at Danzig and other ports.

In spite of the fact that the American Jewish Relief agencies are spending almost \$2,000,000 a month on their relief work in Poland, and that the Red Cross is doing its work on so vast a scale, hundreds of thousands of Jews and Poles will die during the winter unless more aid comes.

"Every box car full of refugees returning to their homes has in it those who die along the way, and those who have contracted typhus," Lieutenant Wright said. "The people try to avoid disease by keeping clean, but it is impossible to do so, under existing conditions. Even our nurses and doctors fall ill of typhus, a disease caused by filth and lice."

The Red Cross and the American Jewish Relief agencies are doing their utmost to keep bodies of Jews and the Gentiles in these stricken lands alive. Six million Jews in eastern Europe face death unless immediate shipments of food, clothing, and bedding from Canada and the United States reach them before the cold weather sets in.

Halton Union Insurance Company

The annual meeting of Halton Union Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company was held in the Town Hall, Acton, Monday, January 20th.

There was not a large attendance, but much interest was manifested. The annual report showed receipts from all sources \$27,586.54 and expenditures \$17,631.85. A balance of \$9,714.69 is on deposit in the Royal Bank, Guelph, Bank of Nova Scotia, Acton, Bank of Nova Scotia, Campbellville, and in the treasury. The losses of the year aggregated \$11,494.65.

On December 31 the company had 3,589 policies in force, carrying a total insurance of \$9,118,685.00.
