Premier Drury At Georgetown

A large and enthusiastic audience greeted Premier Drury at his meeting held in the town hall last Wednesday evening.

Mr. W. F. Bradley was the chairman of the evening and after a few very appropriate introductory remarks called on ex-Roeve Grant, who in the absence of Reeve Dale through illness, extended the welcome of the town to the Premier.

Prof. Hutt made a short address and was followed by the elected member, John F. Ford, who resigned to make a place for Mr. Drury. Mr. Ford explained that he had left his resignation to his supporters and they endorsed his course.

Since the Farmers' Government came into power the time had been short, and said the Premier, they had been harassed by ever watchful enemies who were waiting for them to make a slip. But nevertheless the Government had been successful in all directions for their record of reform, the Premier discussed the good roads and educational and forestry policies of the Government.

Discussing the abolition of patronage by the Government, he said that even the angel Gabriel could not have maintained his integrity in the face of pressure formerly brought to bear on county members when asked to make recommendations for outside positions in civil service.

In connection with the attitude of those who desired one superlative highway as against the Government policy of good roads all over, he jokingly said it had occurred to him to build a race track around the Province and let those who wanted that kind of road drive round and round and round. The Premier took a shot at Mr. Dewar, remarking that he had fired his biggest siege gun and the shell had turned out a dud.

What do these figures mean? Canada's teen age boys are worth in cold cash, three and a half times as much as all her railroads, three and a half times the capital and plant in manufacturing, nearly twice as much as all her farms, about one-third of her total wealth of all kinds. And all this says nothing about the earning and producing capacity of those hands, eyes, feet, etc., through which she lives.

What is Canada doing for her boys? How is she seeking to draw forth to full development their complete powers, to realize fully this great national asset.
