Obituary

MRS. WILLIAM S. HALL
The Rodlands, California, Facts gives the following particulars of the death of Mrs. William S. Hall, of that city, formerly of Hornby in this county:—Mrs. Sarah Hall, wife of W. S. Hall, and mother of Harvey E. Hall, died last night at the family home, 118 Clinton Avenue. When the end was not entirely unexpected, it came as a great shock to relatives and friends. Several months ago Mrs. Hall had a severe illness, from which she had never fully recovered, but recently she had much improved. She was taken critically ill a few days ago and was unconscious much of the time Sunday and Monday, slipping away while unconscious. Mrs. Hall was 84 years of age and a native of Halton County, Ontario, Canada, and the family came to Rodlands in December, 1899, starting work at once on a home on Clinton Avenue, which they have occupied since. She was a member of the Baptist Church, and for many years active in the work of the women's union of the church. In addition to her husband and son, Mrs. Hall is survived by two brothers and two sisters, residents of Toronto.

Editorial Notes

DAYLIGHT SAVING is being advocated by many city dwellers again this year and is sure to be strenuously opposed by the farm population. Definite action should be taken by the Dominion Government to prevent such confusion and inconvenience as prevailed last year.
FORTY-SEVEN NEW branch banks were opened in Canada during the month of January, while seven branches were closed. In the number of new branches opened the Royal Bank headed the list with thirteen, while the Bank of Nova Scotia was second with six. Four branches each were opened by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Union Bank, the Standard Bank, three by the Imperial Bank and Dominion Bank, two by the Home Bank, the Bank of Montreal, Merchants Bank, the Banque Provinciale, while the Molsons Bank and the Hochelaga Bank opened one each.

ONTARIO TOWNS large and small, are growing rapidly, and it is a reassuring sign when they realize the importance of correcting the serious mistakes of the past in regard to town planning. This was evidenced by the sending of a deputation to Premier Drury to urge the enactment of legislation to permit of the forming of commissions to govern growth and development. By carefully considering this point in the future much can no doubt be accomplished that will make for betterment in all towns. It is certainly worth while doing so, and shows that we are becoming more alive in civic matters. The result will be felt by future generations.

THERE APPEARS to be a sincere desire on the part of the Ontario Government to tackle the problem of Provincial highways in a business-like way, and there will be a general disposition towards heartily approving of the good roads programme announced by Hon. Mr. Biggs for the development of permanent highways throughout Western Ontario. Good roads in Ontario were assured when the farmers began to regard motor cars as necessities of country life rather than luxuries for the rich. It is a good sign and promises much for the future.

THE REPORT of the Minister of Public Works, for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1919, tabled in the Commons, shows a total expenditure of nearly twenty-one million and a half, of which eight and a half million dollars was charged to war appropriation.
The expenditure on ordinary account was one million and a half less than during the previous year. The revenue for the year was \$89,492, an increase of \$108,990 over the previous year.

The Secretary of State's report shows 194 naturalization certificates issued during the year, Sweden being in the majority.

There were 612 companies, with a total capitalization of \$214,828,000, incorporated during the year.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS ago if any public man had suggested an act of parliament to compel the erection of lightning rods he would have been deemed a ripe subject for an asylum or jail. In those days every farmer on every concession line was counted fair prey for the cupid-ity of the lightning rod agent.

During the intervening years, however, scientific investigation has shown that properly erected and carefully grounded lightning rods and equipment will, beyond any peradventure, protect buildings against loss from fire by lightning. One of the bills introduced at the first session of the new Government will be an act to make compulsory the installing of lightning rod equipment on practically all barns, elevators, mills and other buildings housing foot-lights, which might be erected in the province in the future. And this bill will be presented by a member of the Government. If enacted this bill will require all such buildings to have lightning rods installed as soon as possible after January 1, 1921. A quantity of non-compliance is provided in the bill.

"ORGANIZATION, CO-OPERATION and education are going hand in hand throughout agricultural districts of the country," is the opinion of W. J. Rutherford, Dean of Saskatchewan College of Agriculture, who expresses the following views: "Farming is not the independent self contained occupation that it was a generation ago. Conditions have changed from the pioneer days, and production has not only to do with supplying the demands of the home, but it must aim to create an export trade. Farming is a real business, successfully carried on by men and women who are not only skilful in the art and practice, but are versed in the science of agriculture. Farmers to-day are not content to know only how to grow good crops, they want to know also how to market them to good advantage. They are interested in the economic problems of their own communities and to a great extent in the problems of their customers in town and city. Agricultural is both industry and commerce and affects both the rural and the city population. The agriculturist of today is not merely a practical farmer, but is necessarily a social worker. Rural communities have men which require college trained men to solve.
