**Obituary**

MISS ISOBEL HEMSTREET

The news of the death of Miss Isobel Hemstreet, only daughter of R. L. Hemstreet, at Toronto, last Monday, was a great shock to her friends and those of her family.

She had not been home for some time, but her real condition was not suspected. She was at home on the 17th inst. and attended the St. Patrick's Day Day banner and entertainment given under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid of Knox Church. She returned to Toronto last Thursday, was taken very ill, removed to the General Hospital and treated by leading physicians of the city, but their services availed nothing.

Her only brother, Frank, was summoned by telegram from Winnipeg, but did not arrive until Tuesday. Her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Barclay of Georgetown, and Mrs. Matthews of Hamilton, attended the funeral on Wednesday afternoon from her father's home to Evergreen Cemetery. On account of the illness of her pastor, Rev. W. M. McRae, services were conducted by Rev. A. E. Marshall. The pallbearers were Messrs. W. F. Dwyer, M. E. Nixon, G. W. McKenzie, Ruthven, Campbell, Rex Hume and Kenneth Agnew. There were a great many beautiful flowers.


