### Radical Reforms to Entrance Exams

Radical reforms in the high school entrance examination system is announced by Hon. F. R. Grant, minister of education. The change takes effect this year. The high school entrance boards under the new plan will be left free to decide whether candidates shall be accepted on the certificates of public school principals or write the examination as usual. The boards will also determine the conditions under which the principals' certificates are to be accepted.

The boards may, in addition, recommend to the minister the admission of candidates who, in their opinions, are fitted for high school work, even tho, in certain respects, they failed to attain the required standard at the written examination. Moreover those who for adequate reasons were unable to write on the examinations may have their applications for admission to high schools considered by the public school inspectors and high school principals at any time.

The above changes involve a considerable alteration and simplification of the existing regulations, which will be modified accordingly. The chief complaint has been that admission by public school principals was hampered by a requirement that the promotion examination papers and results had to be submitted to the entrance board, and the result, in the opinion of many, was merely an entrance examination of a different sort. In future the entrance boards may dispense with a set form of examination and accept such recommendations from principals as are deemed satisfactory.

### Notes and Comments

**BRITAIN AND FRANCE,** the nations which bore the brunt of the fighting in the recent war, have recently indicated that they will not need to ask for further favors in bearing their financial load—a most satisfactory reassurance that they have turned the high road to financial equilibrium. This is very good news, indeed. The recuperative powers of both nations has been as wonderful as the staying powers they developed during the war. With England on her feet again, and France stronger than ever, as the result of regaining that territory, the outlook for greater progress than ever is of the brightest and ought to reassure the days of reconstruction.

A **MEXICAN** report, issued by the Canadian Trade Commission, indicates the sugar requirements for next year at approximately 400,000 tons. This is an increase of 20 per cent. over last year, accounted for by increased population, higher wages, prohibition on development in the export of raw sugar and confectionery. There is at present a shortage of refined sugar in this country, and it is expected that the refiners will not be able to create the shortage and produce the required 35,000 tons per month until the 1st of May. It is not expected by the commission that there will be any reduction in price this year—the shortage in the raw crop is too great—but as Canadian refiners have an ample supply of raw sugar, neither should there be any advance in price.

A **TIMELY RESOLUTION** was passed by a meeting of prominent Ontario horticulturists in Guelph recently in favor of legislation compelling the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, Bell Telephone Company, Niagara Power Commission, and other similar corporations, when about to string wires or erect transmission lines, lines which are likely to injure or interfere with growing trees, to obtain the permission of the Ontario Department of Forestry, the Council of the municipality through which such lines may pass, and the owners of such trees before commencing such work. Many beautiful trees in town and vicinity have been spoiled by careless trimming by linemen, and the property owners and others interested in preserving our fine shade trees have never been consulted before the devastating work was undertaken.

ONTARIO IS FAST becoming a "motor" province. The records for 1919 just compiled, show that there were 127,403 passenger cars in operation during the year, an increase of more than 26,000 over 1918. There were 11,428 trucks and 5,515 motor-cycles. Of the passenger car licenses over a third were city owned—45,514, compared with 39,895 owned outside of the cities. Toronto had 21,747 passenger cars and trucks. The returns indicate that the cities contribute slightly more to the motor license revenue than the farmers. The latter own 46,597 cars, or slightly more than those owned in the cities but the cities have more big, expensive cars, which contribute more largely to the revenue. It will be a surprise to some folks to know that men engaged in the skilled trades own more cars than the business men of Ontario, the figures being 15,048 to 13,887. Doctors own 8,187 cars, manufacturers 4,882 and other professions 5,118.
