### Pension & Benefit Fund Bell Telephone Co.

Sickness Disability Benefits \$111,065.68; death benefits \$19,991 97; accident disability benefits \$15,016.58; pensions \$6,109.28these are some of the payments made for the year 1919 from the Employees' Benefit Fund of the

Bell Telephone Company. The benefit Fund Committee's report just published is an interesting document. It shows gross payments to employees from the

benefit fund in 1919 of \$158,602.09. "During the year," says the report, there was a total of 1,665 sickness cases in which benefits were paid. This is 528 cases less than in 1918. The total days of disability was 68,488 days during 1919-only 278 days less than in 1918-which indicates that the sickness cases in 1919 were no longer duration, and that he the large number of influenza cases which helped to swell the total in 1918, the absence was of a very short duration. In 1918, with 2,188 sickness cases, \$102,963.67 was paid in benefits. In 1919, with only 1,665 sickness cases, \$111,065 crease is due to the higher a verage

wage of employees." In accordance with the recommendation of the committee, the company has established a Medical Department in connection with Employees' pension and Benefit plan, and Dr. G. A. Winters has been appointed to take charge of it as "Medical Advisor", with headquarters at Montreal. Dr. Winters will review all medical certificates and medical examination forms.

It is the intention of the company to inaugurate some form of physical or medical examination of the employees already in the service and to ensure new employees being given work for which they are physically fitted. Should such examination disclose minor ailments or a tendency thereto, the new employee would be made aware of the conditions and advised to consult his or her physician, in order that early treatment might prevent the ailment becoming serious. Valuable and disinterested advice has already been given to employees through this channel. The fund, which now stands at \$500,000, is maintained by the company without contributions any kind from the employees.

Three-Day Safety Convention The first annual meeting of the Canadian National Safety League and the sixth annual meeting of the Ontario Safety League will be held on Tuesday, 18th April, 1920, in the King Edward Hotel, Toronto, commencing at 10 a.m. The morning will be devoted to the registration of delegates and the annual meetings of the two Leagnes, the reports of committees, the election of officers for the onsuing year, and such other busi ness as may come before the meetings. Commencing at 2.15 p.m. on Tuesday, 18th April, and con-tinuing through Wednesday and Thursday, the committee has arranged for a series of important papers on safety, papers which will be of vital interest to every

Government Housing Regarding the Government Housing Scheme the following information may be of assistance to those desirous of building a home. Here is how a \$8,000 house would be paid for: If a house costs \$8000 the purchaser pays \$50 with his application, as a matter of good faith. When the house is in cash or in lot value or both together (making \$800 in all or 10 per cent. of the whole cost of the house.) If applicant is the owner of a lot no deposit is required. Then the remainder is paid in-monthly instalments of \$18 each, during a period of 20 years. When this has been done the property belongs to the applicant. Or the applicant may reduce his indebtedness at the end of year, by any number of \$100 payments. After such payments have been made, his dues will be reduced accordingly. Or he may pay the balance at any time and receive his deed.
