**New Maps for Schools**

Under the direction of the Min-  
ister of Education, 40,000 copies of  
the new map of Europe are being  
distributed free among the schools  
of the Province. The edition is  
intended to supply the needs of the  
schools until the needs of the  
school geography is ready in Sep-  
tember, 1921. The copies of the  
map for the Collegiate Institutes,  
High Schools and continuation  
schools are being sent directly to  
the principals. The copies for the  
public and separate schools are be-  
ing sent to the Public School In-  
spectors of the Province for dis-  
tribution throughout the schools of  
their respective inspectorates. The  
maps should reach all the schools  
before the Easter holidays.

**WHAT ONTARIO** loses by fire  
may be judged from the fact that  
annually property is being destr-  
oyed to the extent of \$12,000,000 or  
\$15,000,000, and three times as  
much timber goes up in smoke as  
is cut for commercial purposes.

**THE DOMINION** Government has  
placed \$500,000 in the estimates for  
the taking of prohibitive referen-  
dums in the various Provinces of  
the Dominion. It is believed all  
the Provinces, but Quebec, will  
take advantage of the new Domini-  
on law, which enables Provinces  
to practically go home. Ontario,  
Manitoba and Saskatchewan have  
already indicated that they will  
request a plebiscite.

**AT LAST** THE MOTHERS of sol-  
diers who fell in the war are to  
receive their just compensation. Ac-  
cording to a statement of the Hon.  
N. W. Rowell in the Federal House  
of Commons recently, mothers of  
soldiers who fell in the war are to  
receive full pensions, regardless of  
circumstances. They will not be  
required to show that they were  
dependent on the sons they lost,  
or that they have no other family  
or income or ability to earn a liv-  
elihood. The pension will be paid  
in all cases by the country in re-  
cognition of the loss sustained.  
Another step forward.

**MONOPOLIES** WILL GET no  
more direct loans from the Ontario  
Government for house-building.  
In future they may issue their own  
bonds for that purpose, and the  
Government will guarantee them.  
New legislation covering these two  
points was introduced in the Legis-  
lature Tuesday afternoon of last  
week by Hon. H. C. Nixon, Provin-  
cial Secretary.

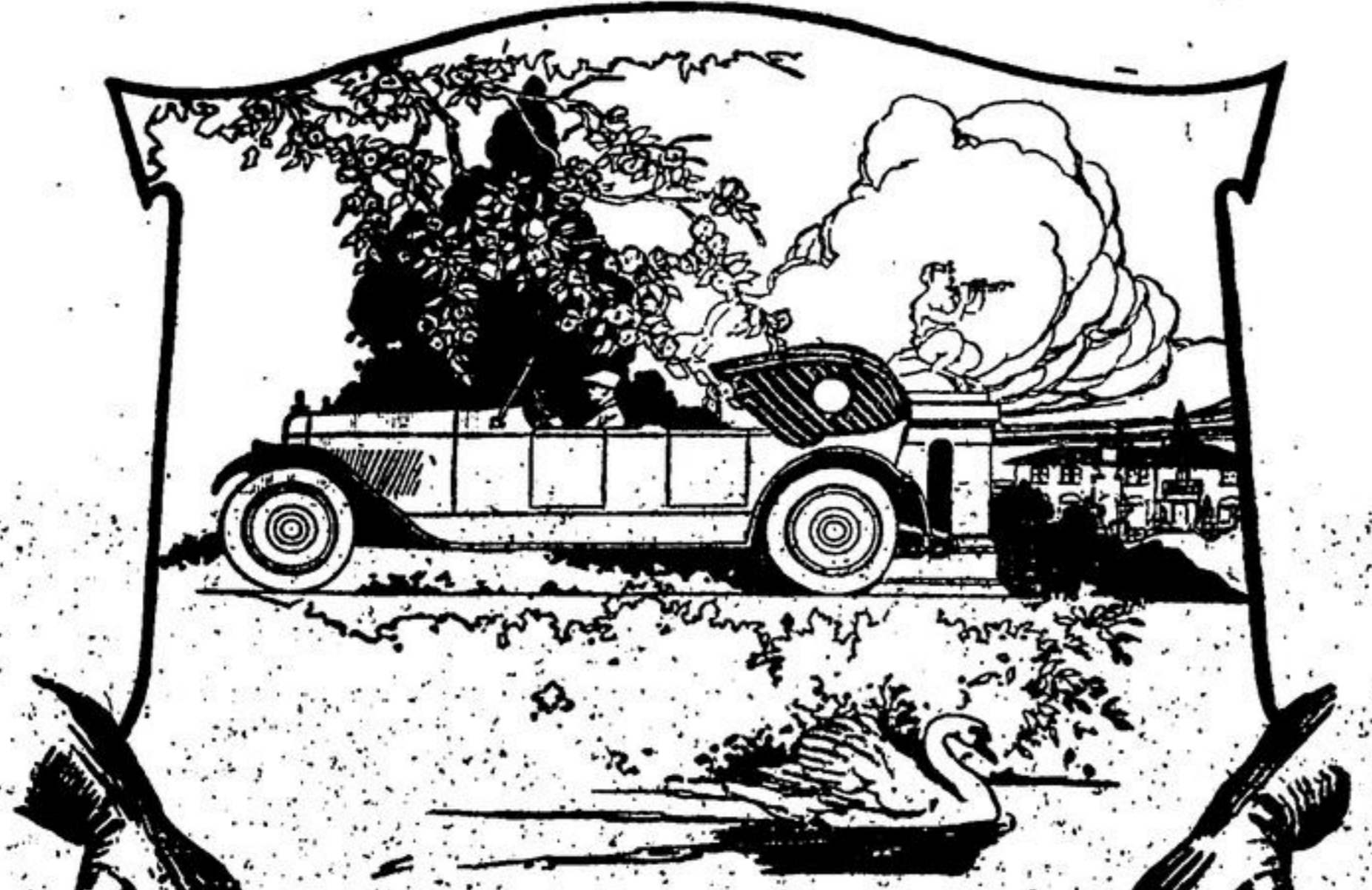
Mr. Nixon informed the house  
that ten days before, word had been  
received from the Dominion Govern-  
ment that there would be no  
further loans to the Provincial  
authorities for housing purposes.  
In view of this, his amendment  
was to wind up the work under the  
present act at the end of this year.  
The amendment to the munic-  
ipal act allows municipalities to  
issue their own bonds, which will  
be guaranteed by the Government.  
The money raised in such a way  
will then be expended for housing.  
During the year, seventy munic-  
ipalities in Ontario were carrying  
on active work under the act. For  
the completion of the work now  
under way there is a revised list of  
amounts which may be loaned.

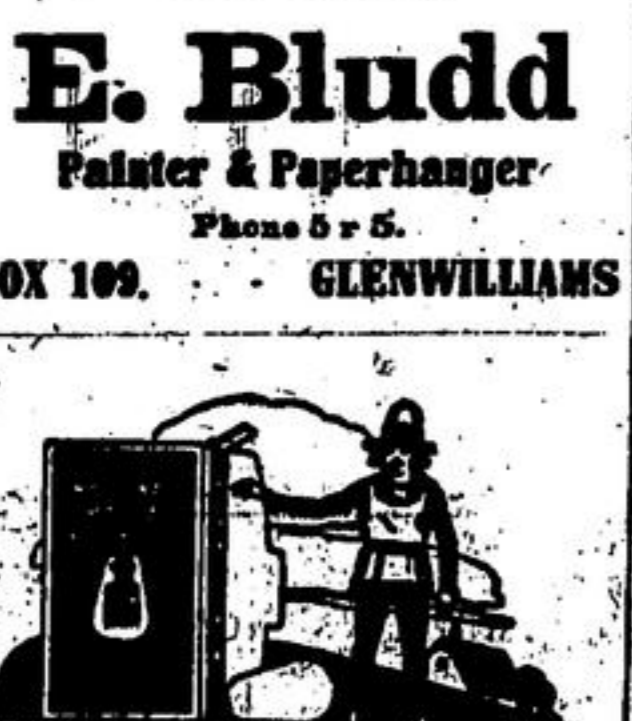

**LEARNED SOME UGLY FACTS**

Two Cases Where Evendroppers Prob-

**Columbus' Tiny Vessels**

The largest of the three ships in  
which Columbus made his first voyage,  
the Santa Maria, was about ninety  
feet long and twenty feet broad and  
was of about 150 tons burden. A single-  
deck covered it throughout. It had  
three masts, one supporting a trian-  
gular lateen sail, which was more pic-  
turesque than serviceable for an ocean  
voyage. The vessel was about the size  
of one of our modern coasting schoon-  
ers. The Santa was somewhat smaller,  
and the Niña, Spanish for baby, was  
well named, being scarcely larger than  
it carried, and not more than fifty  
tons. The three vessels carried only 100  
persons in all. Irving says it was not  
for want of large vessels in the Span-  
ish port that those of Columbus were  
so small. He considered them better  
adapted to voyages of discovery, as  
they required but little depth of water  
and could therefore move easily and  
safely coast unknown shores and ex-  
plore bays and rivers.

**War Coinage in Germany.**

Due to metal shortage Germany has  
instituted iron coinage. The fractional  
nick coins are no longer of copper  
but are forged of the metal of the  
Munich-Martin steel. The coinage of  
copper was discontinued in 1917. Al-  
uminum had been coined in a small ex-  
tent before the war, but the smallest  
coins, one and two pfennig pieces, are  
now made of aluminum, which is more  
obtained by ordinary water, soda,  
etc., than by distilled water. Zinc  
coins have recently been intro-  
duced. Zinc coins had been used in  
French Indo-China; they are again  
put up to corrode, especially when  
impure with lead, cadmium and iron,  
in distilled water than in ordinary wa-  
ter; they turn yellow-brown, but as-  
sume a pleasant gray tint in soda and  
salt. On the whole, the cheapest  
coins have answered best.—Engineer  
Inc.
