Orphan Buried to Death

1. The Council of the Corporation of Georgetown has constituted a local improvement re-inforced concrete pavement with concrete curb on Mill St. East, Mill St. West and Main St.
2. The cost of the work on Mill St. East is \$1663.85 of which \$110.24 is the Corporation's share and \$1553.61 is the owner's share; Mill St. West cost is \$2867.56 of which \$191.71 is the Corporation's share and \$2675.85 is the owner's share; Main St. the cost is \$10,390.00 of which \$7390.00 is the Corporation's share and \$3000.00 the owner's share. 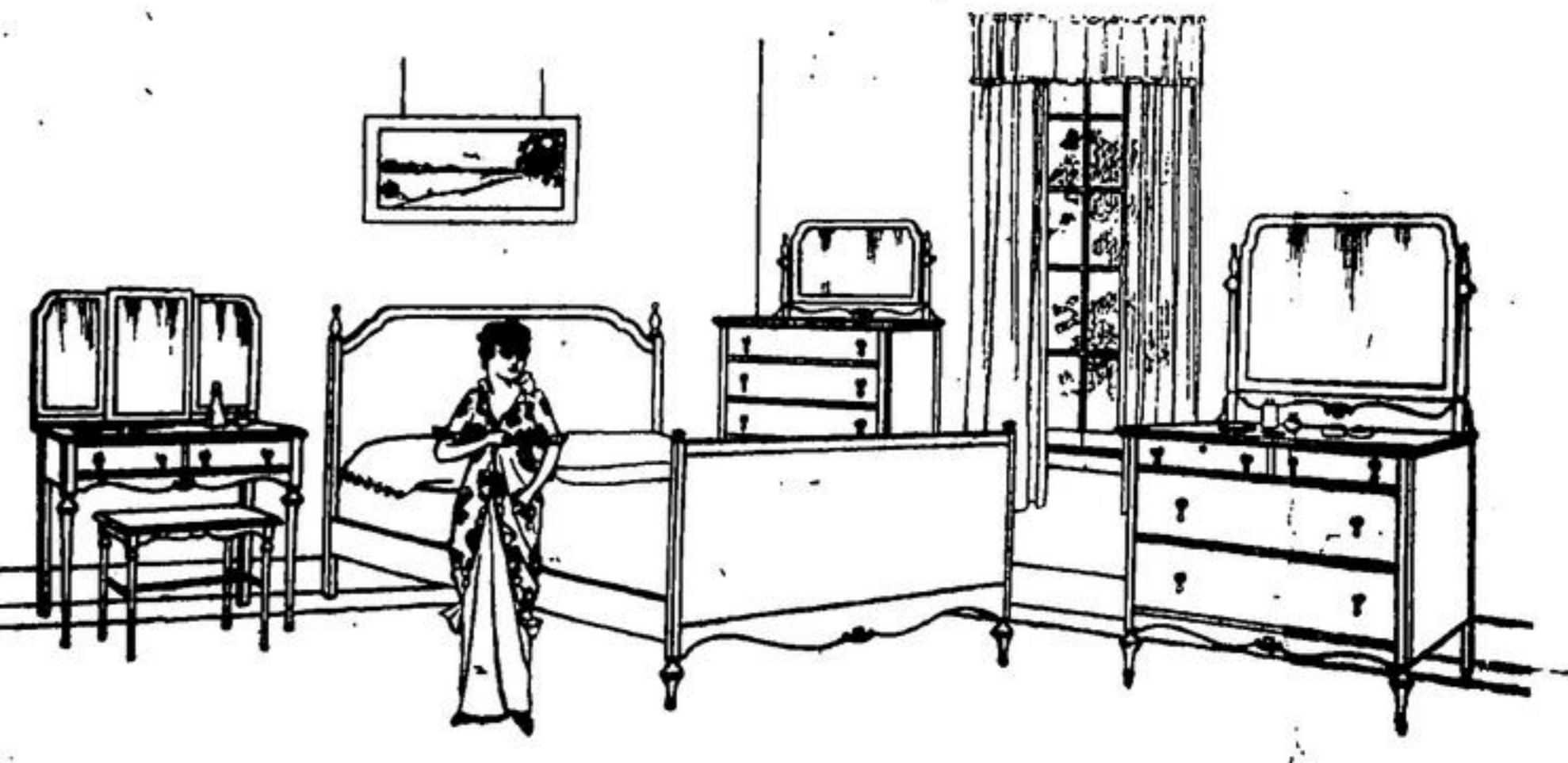
