Town Council

Council met on Monday evening with Reeve Dale in the chair and Counsellors Rush, Anthony, McMillan and McIntyre present.
Minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed.
Mr. Wm. Ward addressed Council re the burial of a dead dog in Brooklyn which nobody claimed to own. He was instructed to bury same at the expense of the Corporation.
Mr. R. J. Hynes addressed Council re placing more insurance on Municipal buildings.
Moved by McMillan seconded by McIntyre that resolution passed April 6th, re tariff on water rates for lawn sprinkling be rescinded and that the rate be placed at \$8 per year for an ordinary sized lot and \$1.50 for each additional lot or part of a lot, and when no house connection is provided the water rate be paid \$0.00 and \$2.50.
Carried.

Moved by McMillan seconded by McIntyre that we order from the Neptune Meter Co. one Great type meter, 3 inch, at \$98.85 and one Dia 2 inch meter at \$31.—Carried.

Moved by McIntyre seconded by Rush that the request of the ratepayers on Albert St. for a sidewalk from Guelph to McNabb St. be granted, they having petitioned Council for same.—Carried.

Communications were read from Provincial Paper Mills re fire by-die in Toronto, re wafering carts; Rev. Griffin Thompson re claim for damages to car; Dominion Rubber System Limited re fire hose; Miss K. D. Ryan, Sec'y-Hydro, re electric fire alarm.
Moved by McMillan seconded by McIntyre that the Clerk be instructed to forward plans of temporary water supply to Provincial Board of Health as requested.—Carried.

Moved by McIntyre seconded by Rush, that in case of an extension of waterworks the entire Council be consulted as to the size of pipe to be laid.—Carried.

Improvements Coming
