NEWS FROM OTTAWA is to the effect that the Dominion Government will set apart October 25th as the date for taking the prohibition referendum asked for by the Province of Ontario. This will mean a comparatively short campaign during September and October.

SO FAR AS LAW can do it, the United States has put under permanent ban the manufacture and sale of all beverages with an alcoholic content of more than one half of one per cent. All state laws legalizing the sale of beer or wine with more alcoholic "kick" in it than one-half of one per cent. are declared unconstitutional—such laws as those recently adopted in New York, New Jersey and Delaware.

New Hydro Rates

The new Hydro rates show considerable reduction after the minimum of 75c per month is reached. The following shows the new and the old rates:
New rates Domestic 2.5-1.25, Min. 75c per month not, prompt payment 10%. Old rates 3-1.5.
Commercial 5.25-5.00 Old rate 6.8-6.
Power 2.8-1.8-1.5 Old rate 3.1-2.-1.5.
Street lights \$9.50 per light per year. Old rate \$11.00.
Power from Commission to Municipality reduced from \$88.00 per h.p. to \$85.00 per h.p.
It will be noticed from this schedule that the minimum bill for Domestic and Commercial has been raised to 75c per month net. This rate has been fixed by the Ontario Commission for all Municipalities.

Car Struck Horses

Two Animals Killed and Three Injured by Geolph Radial

Two horses were killed, three badly injured and eight women fainted when a Toronto-bound radial express car of the Toronto Suburban, Geolph division, struck five horses on the tracks between Churchville and Meadowdale, 17 miles from Toronto, at midnight on Friday last.
The radial car was carrying members of Oriole Rebekah Lodge, Toronto, from Georgetown, where they had been visiting Verdun Lodge, when it crashed into the horses. The front trucks of the car were derailed, and had the car gone twenty yards farther it would have topped over a sleep-cum-bankment. The driver escaped any serious injuries, while for a few minutes the women passengers were stricken with panic.
