

Found Dead in Buggy

David Cunningham, a young man 28 years of age, son of Mr. James Cunningham, of Ospringe, met death in a mysterious manner on Sunday, Aug. ist, the circumstances concerning which are at the present time being investigated. It seems that the young man left home about 2 o'clock on Sunday afternoon with his home and buggy, but did not inform anyone where he was going, and at 10 o'clock the same night he was discovered by Mr. Clordon, who keeps the store at Ospringe, and Joseph Stewart, in the buggy in front of the store dead. The remains were held in the buggy by a small bolt, which caught in the clothing, thus preventing it from falling out. He had evidently been dead but a very short time, as the body was still quite warm.

Dr. Angus Mackinnon, of Guelph, coroner, was at once notified, and drove out to the scene. After making a thorough examination of the
