IN ANSWER to enquiries regarding the additional water supply now being pumped into the mains from the William Cleave spring west of Main St., we beg to state that the same has been approved, and permission given to use it as a temporary supply by the Provincial Board of Health.

IT IS RUMORED there are some cases of contagious diseases in town not being reported to the Medical Health Officer. Where a contagious disease exists in a household and the same is not reported to the Medical Health Officer, those responsible for such neglect are liable to severe punishment by way of fine or imprisonment. It is important that the health of the community should be protected and we would suggest the Board of Health look into the matter.

THAT IT WOULD be impossible for the Dominion Government to authorize the holding of the referendum in Ontario before April 15, 1921, the date recently fixed by proclamation, excepting at a cost of half a million dollars to the people, was made clear by Premier Meighen on Saturday in replying to the delegation representing the Ontario Referendum Committee, which waited upon him and asked that the voting take place on October 25th, the date tentatively agreed upon before the issuance of the formal proclamation. "We have not," said the Prime Minister, "the power to change the date even if we were willing, and I am not prepared to say that, even if we had the power, we should spend half a million dollars to spare the short measure of time involved."

76th Battalion C.E.F. NOTICE
