THAT IT WOULD be impossible for the Dominion Government to authorize the holding of the referendum in Onterio before April 18, 1921, the date recently fixed by proclamation, excepting at a cost of half a million dollars to the people, was made clear by Premier Meighen on Saturday in replying to the delegation representing the Ontario Referendum Committee, which waited upon him and asked that the voting take place on October 25th, the date tentatively agreed upon before the issuance of the formal proclamation. "We have not," said the Prime Minister, "the power to change the date even if we were willing, and I am not prepared to say that, even if we had the power, we should spend half a million dollars to spare the short measure of time involved."




