WE REURNT TO NOTE that there has been general neglect of the cemetery so far this season. IN ANSWER to questions by a town ratepayer regarding purity of additional water supply being pumped into the mains, we beg to reply:—In the first place the water must have tested satisfactory to the Provincial Board of Health or a permit to use same would not have been given. Secondly, it is the duty of the Council and Medical Health Officer to have water analyzed at short intervals, especially during the hot weather, and if any dangerous impurities exist to have same eliminated by chlorination if necessary, in order that the health of the community may not be impaired. We believe we have a Council and Medical Health Officer who will protect citizens against any danger by giving this matter the attention it demands.

Stewarttown, Aug. 16, 1920.
The Council met pursuant to adjournment, the Revue in the chair, members present, Elliott, McDowell and Thompson.
The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.
Elliott-Thompson, that the treasurer pay the following accounts: Thos. Clisbourn for drawing and putting in culvert on sidewalk between lots 3 and 1, con. 1, \$6.00; G. Huffman \$26, good roads money due Division No. 19, J. E. Campbell 38 1/2 yds. gravel put on town line at 15c per yd. \$5.77; H. Gibbens 27 loads gravel supplied Division 18, \$2.70; R. H. Shortell 20 yds. gravel at 15c per yd. \$3.—Carried.
McDowell-Thompson, that the treasurer pay Thos. Douglas \$10 for operating grader and \$67.00 for grading 7 to 5, 8th line, D. Alcock Street \$35.80 account for surveying part lot 18, con. 8; Canada Ingot Iron-Co., Guelph, the following account: 2 road graders at \$28.50 each, \$57.12; 1 culvert 12" by 18 ft. to Jas. Grant, 1 culvert 12" x 14 1/2, to Robt. Stark, 1 culvert 18" x 16 1/2, to Robt. Stark, \$64.80; total \$192.22.—Carried.
Thompson-Elliott, that the treasurer pay S. McClure \$113.96 for work done in Glenwilliams to be charged to Statute labor also for gravelling and cleaning out ditches and repairing culvert on lot 26, 9th line, \$146. W. Rutledge for gravelling town line, lot 29 and supplying gravel for same \$25.15 being Esqueuing's share.—Carried.
Elliott-Thompson, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to apportion the interest accruing from the Railway Bonus fund amongst the sections in the N and N.W. Railway group and that said by-law be read the first time.
Carried.
McDowell-Elliott, that the by-law to apportion the Bonus fund interest be read the second and third times and passed.—Carried.
Thompson-Elliott, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to assess the Township for the year 1920 and that said by-law be now read the first time.—Carried.
Thompson-Elliott, that the by-law to assess the Township of Esqueuing be now read the second and third times and passed and the blanks be filled with the rate of 3 mills for township purposes, 10 7/10 for county purposes and good roads and 4 7/10 for general school rate.—Carried.
McDowell-Thompson that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to borrow the sum of \$5000 from the Merchants Bank, Georgetown, to meet the current expenses of the Township and that said by-law be now read the first time.
Carried.
Thompson-McDowell, that the by-law to borrow the sum of \$5000 be now read the second and third times and passed.—Carried.
Elliott-Thompson, that the Council adjourn to meet again Sept. embler 18th, at 2 p.m.—Carried.
