Obituary

JOHN EVANS On Tuesday, August 3rd, Mr. John Evans passed away at the home of his daughter Mrs. Jas. A. Frazer at Boulah, Man. Deceased was born at Clough, Co. Antrim, Ireland, and came to Canada about 19 years of age. After a few years at Watertown he moved to a farm at Georgetown where he remained over 40 years. From here he went to Victoria, B.C., where he has since lived with the exception of a few years in California. On November 8th, 1885, he married Janet Fraser, youngest daughter of the late James Fraser of Esquimaux, who predeceased him by 2 years, her remains being interred at Vancouver. They were the parents of ten children of whom eight survive: Rev. J. Fraser Evans, Patterson, Cal.; Mrs. J. T. Taylor and Miss Margaret Evans, Sacramento, Cal.; W. T. Evans, Georgetown, Ont.; Mrs. A. McMillan, Manitow, and Mrs. J. A. Fraser, John P. Evans and Joseph L. Evans of Boulah. There are fourteen grand children.

Decceased was in his 88rd year and during his illness of several years was kindly and tenderly ministered to by his self-sacrificing daughter Margaret. Deceased was a staunch Presbyterian. During his long residence in this section he won the respect and esteem of a host of friends and carried the best wishes of all with him when he left to make his home in the west.

The remains were taken to Vancouver and interred beside those of his beloved wife who had predeceased him.

RICHARD GRAHAM One of Esquimaux's oldest and most highly respected residents in the person of Richard Graham, passed away at the home of his son-in-law Mr. E. Huffman on Saturday last. Deceased was the only son of the late John Graham and was born on the farm, 7th line, Esquimaux in 1839. In 1860 he married Alice N. Coyne of Trafalgar, who with three daughters and four sons survive him. Mrs. E. C. Huffman, Mrs. N. F. Lindsay, Acton; Mrs. J. E. Haines, Toronto; John of the 7th line, R. J. on the old homestead, Geo. W. C. of Toronto and Dr. W. J. of Brooklyn, N.Y.

Decceased took an active interest in municipal affairs and served in the Township Council for over 30 years as Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councillor. He was a past president of the Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Co. and was a director at the time of his death. He was also an active member of the Peel Fire Insurance Co. In politics he was a liberal and in religion a life long Methodist. His death is the first break in the family.

The funeral took place from the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. E. G. Huffman, 8th line, on Tuesday afternoon when the remains were interred in North Cemetery. The service was conducted by deceased's pastor Rev. Wray L. Davidson. The pall-bearers were the four sons and three sons-in-law.

MRS. F. W. BROOKE After an illness of some months' duration, Mary A. Whitby, beloved wife of F. W. Brooke, passed away at her home, 17 Jackman Avenue, Toronto, on Saturday, Aug. 21st. Deceased was born in Leeds County, but moved to Markdale with her parents when quite young. She was married on Dec. 25th, 1880. Besides her husband a family of five sons and one daughter remain to mourn the loss of a beloved mother. They are: Dr. John, Toronto; Fred W., Jr., and H. Grover in the Southern States; Miss Dorothy, Frank and Philip, Toronto. She also leaves one sister, Mrs. A. Beattie, Toronto, and six brothers, viz.: Fred Whitby, Oregon; E. O. Whitby, Markdale; J. W. Whitby, London; A. J. Whitby, Alberta; C. L. Whitby, St. Thomas and Lenox Whitby of Toronto. Deceased was a resident of Georgetown for twenty years prior to her removal five years ago, and her many friends deeply regret her death.

The funeral took place from the home of Mr. A. Watson, Georgetown, on Monday afternoon when the remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev. Wray L. Davidson.
