Town Council

Council met on Friday evening Reeve Dale in the chair and Councilors McIntyre, Rush and Anthony present. Moved by McIntyre seconded by Anthony that by-law No. 1, to provide for the borrowing of \$30,000, from the Lieutenant Governor in Council under the provisions of sections 7 and 9 and sub-section 9 of section 90 of the Ontario Housing Act 1919, and for issuing of debentures for said amount to be deposited with the Treasurer of the Province of Ontario as collateral security for the payment of said loan, be now read a second and third times and finally passed and that the seal of the Corporation be attached thereto. Carried. Moved by Rush seconded by Anthony that the tax rate for 1920 be \$18 mills. Carried. Moved by Anthony seconded by McIntyre that the tender of Josh ua and Robert Logan for the digging and filling of a ditch on Edith Street for waterworks at 2 1/2 cents per cubic foot be accepted. Carried. Moved by McIntyre seconded by Rush that the tender of A. Murdoch and W. C. Cunningham for the laying of cement sidewalks in Georgetown for 1920 at 27 cents per square foot be accepted and that the Clerk be instructed to prepare specifications accordingly. Carried. There were 14 applications for the position of town constable, 2 local and 12 outsiders. No doubt a choice will soon be made. Owing to next regular meeting falling on Labor Day, Council adjourned to meet on Friday evening, September 10th.

Rates for Telephone Service

The rates for exchange service proposed for Georgetown under the new schedule are shown in the following table.
