Co-operative Quarterly Meeting
The 3rd Quarterly Meeting of the Georgetown and Glenwilliams Co-operative Society Ltd., was held in the Town Hall, Georgetown, on Thursday last the 26th inst., a good representation of shareholders being present. President A. Annandall occupied the chair and was supported by the Director and Managing Secretary, H. Pritchett. In presenting the 3rd Report and Balance Sheet the chairman felt sure they would all agree that same was very gratifying; at the same time making an urgent appeal for more share capital to enable the society to extend in other lines of merchandise. The Balance Sheet was unanimously approved. The sales were nearly \$11,000.00 and after allowing interest on share capital and placing \$100 to Reserve Fund the balance disposable allowed a 5% dividend and a balance carried forward to next quarter. Messrs. A. Hazellwood, J. Munson and N. Gill were elected to the Board of Directors. Messrs. C. Davis and A. Sample were elected auditors and Messrs. J. Weaver, J. McCartney, W. G. Rossel, R. Scott, W. Merritt, C. Glendon and E. Larsson were nominated for Board of Directors for next quarterly meeting. A resolution was passed that the President, Mr. A. Annandall, and the Manager, H. Pritchett, interview Premier Drury on the occasion of his visit to Georgetown on Monday, Sept. 6th.


