PREMIER AND MRS. DRURY  
PRESENT**

The Community Picnic held in the park on Monday was one of the most enjoyable events of the season and the large crowd present went home well satisfied at the close of the day. Everybody was sociable, everybody had a good time, and we all seem to know one another better as a result.

At 10 a.m. the half games took place in the park. The competing teams and results were as follows: 1st game Town won from Mills - Score 9-4.

At 1 p.m. the grand parade, which was without doubt the best yet seen in town, left the park. It was headed by our two worthy citizens Messrs. J. A. Willoughby and L. E. Fleck in costume seated in a phaeton drawn by a white horse. The former represented the Esquering side while the latter represented a blushing maiden of the Sunny South reclined on the shoulder of the Irishman.

Then came the Minstrel Jazz Band, led by V. A. Smith; Georgetown Brass Band, led by S. Craig and Glen Ban (in costume) led by L. Bealmont.

Reeve Dale and Councillors Anthony, Rush, McIntyre and McMillan in an auto were followed by Toronto boys' quartet, decorated acrobats and calisthumpians.

- After the procession the gathering assembled in and surrounding the grand stand where Reeve Dale in a few appropriate words introduced Premier Drury who was given a splendid ovation.
- Premier Drury in opening stated that he had been to Georgetown and was not a political one but simply to take part in an event being held for the purpose of promoting a better understanding between town and country and the betterment of the community generally. Now before the movement to promote town and country was being felt. Canadian people are looking for the development of the smaller towns and it would prove for the best socially, intellectually and materially. He was sorry that certain technicalities prevented the proclaiming of Georgetown a town on this occasion; these he hoped would soon be overcome as population and enterprise made Georgetown worthy of the name. He had had all kinds of experience since going into parliament but the government was endeavoring to work in the best interests of the people of the province. Regarding Hydro Rationals the people had a right to know why the government took action. Hydro Rationals were not an essential part of Hydro development but the hands of Hydro development had not been stayed and such development for the use of the people should be done with all speed. But some arrangement should be made whereby the small towns should be able to secure power at or somewhere near the price charged larger centres, and farms should be served at a reasonable rate. The government would make an earnest attempt to secure a system of equitable prices to all. The rationals were held up in order to secure information to assure the government that they would be a benefit to the people before entering on the expenditure of millions of dollars. While the Hydro Commission have done splendid work they don't know it all. The government will put nothing in the way of any sound scheme for Hydro development.
- In closing the Premier stated that he was proud of having the honor of representing Halton in the legislature. Any interests of Halton not contrary to the welfare of the province would have his whole-hearted support.
- During the afternoon Premier Drury made himself at home in

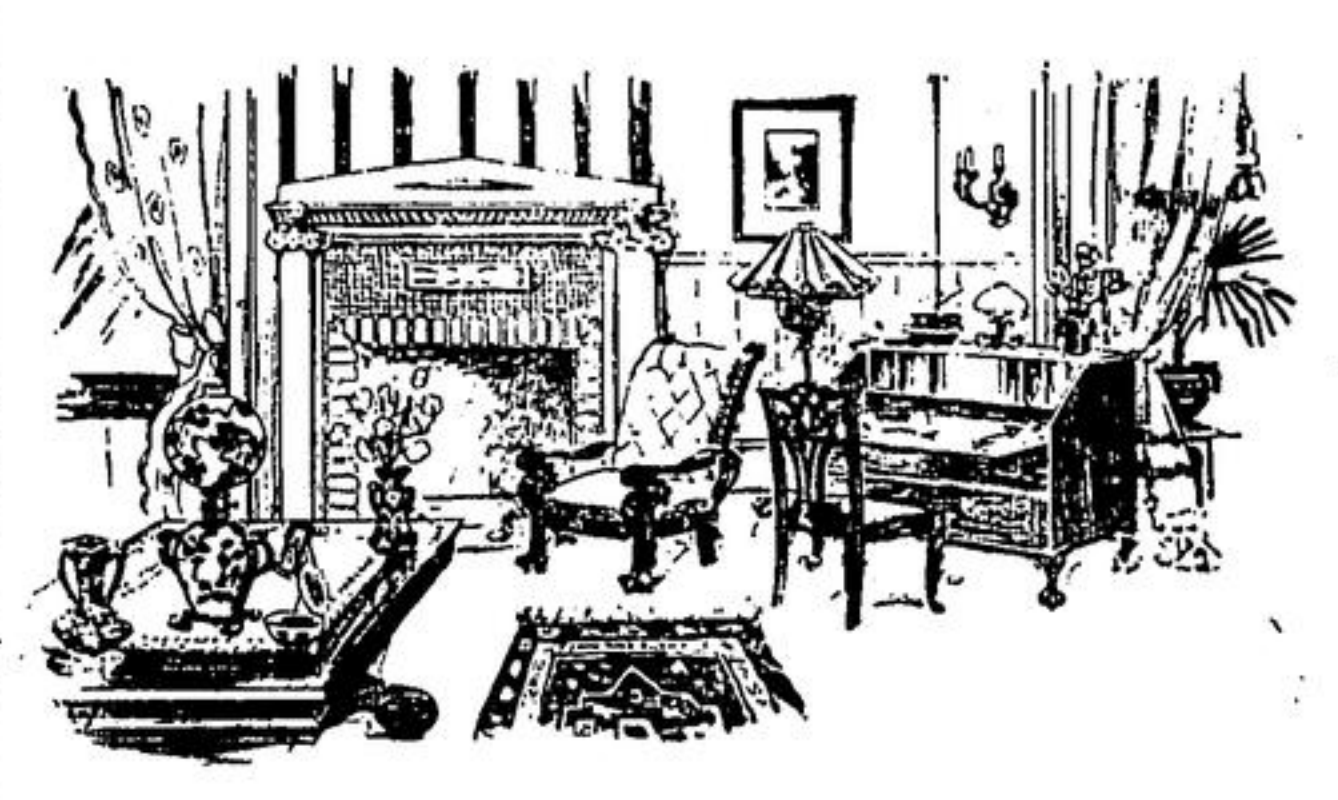
