Town Council

Council met at 8 p.m. Oct. 4 with Reeve Dale in the chair and Councilors all present.

Minutes of the three previous meetings were read and confirmed. Rev. Davidson as a representative from the Horticultural Society addressed Council, re planting of plots in different parts of the town in bulbs.

Clerk was instructed to write Provincial Board of Health; to have light placed at corner of Durham and Murdoch street; put insurance on pumping outfit and to issue cheques of \$15.00 to Howard Hamilton and Albert Post, to help pay expenses as delegates to Firemen's meeting at Welland.

Francis Melville, constable, was sworn in as a local Inspector under the O.T.A.

Moved by J. C. Rush, seconded by W. C. Anthony, that by-law No. 10, to appoint an officer, under section 120, of C George V, 1910, whose duty it shall be to enforce the provisions of the Ontario Temperance Act within the municipality of Georgetown be now read a first time. Carried.

Moved by D. A. McIntyre, seconded by J. C. Rush, that by-law No. 11, to appoint an officer, under section 120, of C George V, 1910, whose duty shall be to enforce the provisions of the Ontario Temperance Act within the municipality of Georgetown, be now read a second and third time and finally passed and that the seal of the corporation be attached thereto. Carried.

Moved by J. C. Rush, seconded by W. C. Anthony, that the name of Wm. Rozel be added to the Georgetown Fire Co. as proposed by P. Armstrong. Carried.

Moved by W. C. Anthony, seconded by D. McIntyre, that the Horticultural Society be allowed to plant bulbs and flowers in the plots at library, corner Main and Guelph, at J. M. Huck's corner of Guelph and John streets, at John McDonald's and on King st. in front of J. C. Rush's house. Carried.

Moved by W. C. Anthony, seconded by J. C. Rush, that the following account be passed: W. C. Cunningham, (Good Roads) \$45.00. Carried.

Moved by W. C. Anthony, seconded by D. McIntyre, that the clerk be authorized to have cheques issued to Albert Post and Harold Hamilton, for \$15.00 for expenses on Firemen's Delegation to Welland. Carried.

Moved by W. C. Anthony, seconded by D. Mr. Willoughby addressed the council re getting water for his Club House at the Golf Links.

Moved by J. C. Rush, seconded by W. McMillan, whereas it appears from letter published by Dr. Watson in the Georgetown Herald that considerable lawlessness prevails in the municipality, which he desires should be stopped. Be it resolved and it is hereby enacted that Dr. F. J. Watson be appointed a constable for the village of Georgetown. Carried.

Moved by W. McMillan, seconded by W. C. Anthony, that the Clerk be instructed to prepare contract between corporation and J. A. Willoughby to give Mr. Willoughby water for his club house at a minimum cost of \$50 a year, and that rate of 10 cents per 1000 gallons and on terms agreed between Mr. Willoughby and corporation for period of five years. Carried.

Council met in special session at 8 p.m. Members all present and the Reeve in the chair.

Dr. Watson and Rev. Moore addressed the council in regard to moral welfare of the town and in regard to Dr. Watson's appointment as constable.

A representative from the United Steel Product Co. addressed the council re reinforcement for Queen street pavement and he was given the order for the same.
