Halt Opposed Union
The Public Service Commission
held sittings yesterday at Brampton.
W. D. Gregory in the chair.
Halt, Peel and Dufferin re-
presentatives were there on invitation,
with figures of expenditure in 1919 on
Jails, registry, crown attorneys and
sheriff's offices and to discuss a con-
solidation proposal. Halt was re-
presented by Judge Elliot, the crown
attorney, registrar, sheriff, jailer and
clerk of the County court, with the
warden and Mr. Hillmer on behalf of
the County Council. All of them op-
posed consolidation and united in pro-
testing against a union jail. Dufferin
favored a union jail and one crown
attorney for the three counties, but
got no support from Peel.

Knox Church Anniversary

**Large Congregation Enjoyed Splen-
did Banquet by Rev. Dr. Wallace**
Anniversary services were held
in Knox church on Sunday last
when large congregations had the
pleasure of listening to splendid
sermons delivered by Rev. Dr.
Wallace, of Toronto a former pastor
of the morning service, after
reading the 6th chapter of Ephesians
from the 22nd verse, Dr.

thing. Come back to Him. Get
away from the rush of life, think

touch of God is on our hearts.
God is calling his church back to
Him. If the home and home life
is to stand it used to be or should
be? Jesus was subject unto His
parents and children of today
should obey their parents in every
detail. The Christian home is
deadly and must be main-
tained. It is a great influence in
the community. In some coun-
tries today, marriage is only a
temporary contract and home ex-
ists for state and not for build-
ing up of morality. How shall we
keep the Christian home? A per-
sonal responsibility to God rests
on each one of us. We must all
face it ourselves and it is a duty
that concerns the vital things of
when parents leave the training of
their children to others and they go
out into the world not having had
the influence of a Christian home.
Bringing home and church into

Band of Halton Rifles

At a meeting of the officers of
the Halton Rifles held at Milton
on Saturday, the organization of
the band was discussed, and the
task was committed to Major
Brown, and Lieut. Kennedy, of
Georgetown, and Lieut. Peacock,
of Milton.
The band is to consist of twenty
four pieces, and inasmuch as no
town in the county is considered
big enough to maintain a band of
this size, the forming of a band on
a composite basis was favored, the
band to be divided between two
towns, say Milton and Geor-
getown.
A band master could be engaged
to conduct rehearsals in the two
towns on the same pieces of music
and so arrange the instrumentation
that each half of the band would
be a unit, a complete band,
capable of playing programs, and
at the same time the two units
could be combined to form one big
band capable of playing concert
music as well as any of the Regi-
mental bands in Toronto.
While for military purposes,
each unit would be limited to
twenty men for practice and ordi-
nary engagements, it would en-
roll as many as the bandmaster
sees fit.
The government grants the sum
of \$140.00 per annum to defray
expenses, as well as uniforms, and
with the cooperation of the citi-
zens of the towns in which the
band units are located, it should
be feasible to maintain a band of
which the two towns, the regi-
ment as well as the whole county
might be proud of.—COM
