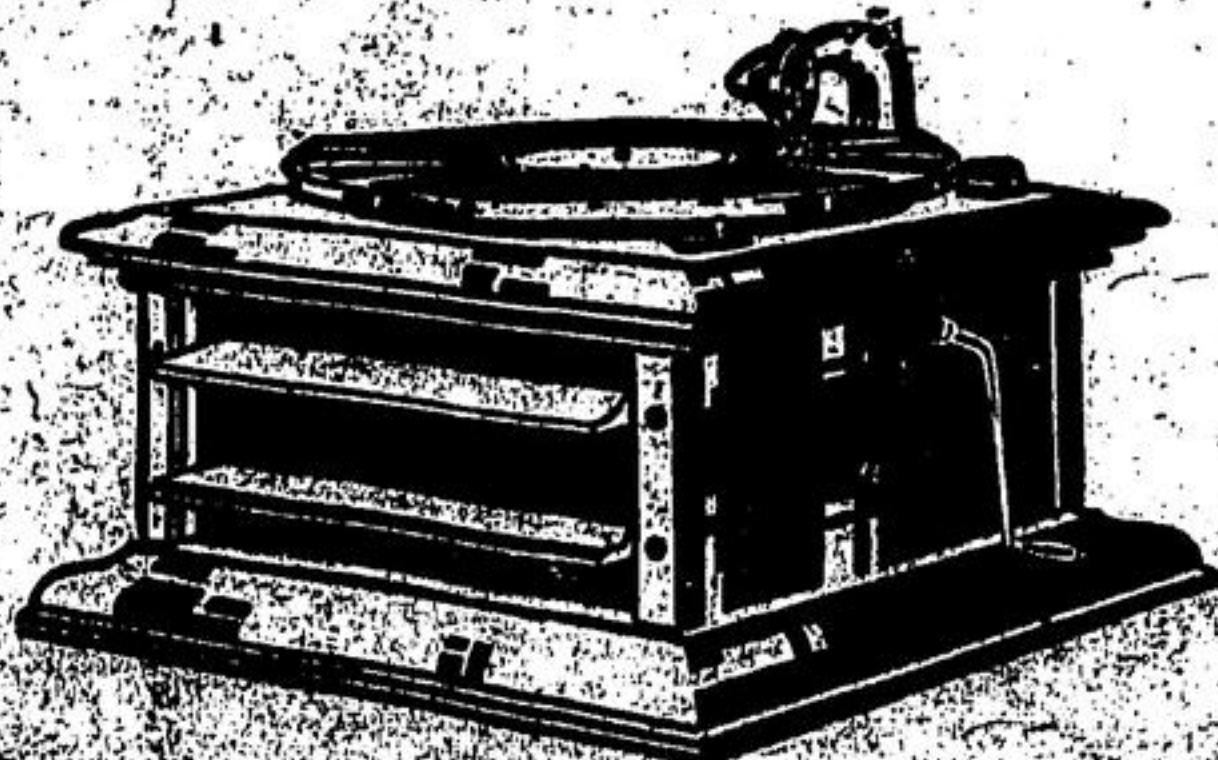

Correspondence

The following letter from the Labrador Medical Mission to the local branch here will prove interesting to many of our readers:

Ottawa, Nov. 17th, 1930

Mrs. D. J. MATHEW,
Georgetown, Ont.

My dear Mrs. Mathew: Thank you very much for the splendid envelope, for it is indeed gratifying to have your Branch undertake the support of one of these homeless children in Labrador and I can assure you Dr. Grenfell and his associates greatly appreciate your co-operation. With food and clothing at unobtainable prices it is quite a responsibility to have a family of forty healthy, hearty boys and girls to provide for. These children have one or both parents dead and often come to us in a half-starved condition. It is wonderful, though, how quickly they respond to good food, care and personal cleanliness. Often in a month or a year a child is hardly recognizable as the same child that came to our doors. These children are apt and capable and do well at school and a few of them excel in their studies. A pair of blind twin girls, brought to Halifax Institution for the Blind by Dr. Grenfell when only about seven years of age, are now refined and accomplished young women, capable of earning a good living, even though blind. Think what it has meant to them to be educated and trained so they can be independent. Another boy who has been brought up in the Orphanage is now at Amherst College, studying Medicine, and will come back into the Mission employ. Many teachers, nurses and domestics have gone out from the Orphanage and quite a number of the boys brought up there served eggs, peas and some of them gave their lives in defence of the Empire. All these facts make one feel how worthy is the undertaking to help one of these orphans to help themselves. It means just the difference between a wail, like "Topsy," who was not brought up but just "grewed," and a self-respecting citizen who can earn a living and is an asset to the community.

Thank you for the contribution towards the Orphanage repairs. Every cent counts.

Dr. Bradford is a very busy man, but I think that we would like to make it attractive enough for him to remain. Nurse Murray is still there and doing splendid work.

Dr. Padden has been recalled to Boston sooner than I anticipated, so that it will be impossible, at present, to send him to your Branch, much as I would like to do so.

Limehouse

When Miss Hannah Augusta Newton entered into rest at her home at Limehouse on Tuesday, Dec. 7th, the community lost a choice spirit. Miss Newton had been in poor health for some time, and was gradually failing. She intended to go to Sarnia, where two brothers and her sister, Mrs. Nickell, reside, last week, to spend the winter there, but her strength was not equal to the journey. Patient and uncomplaining, she was to the end, her thought ever being to minister to others. Thus her life was spent. Miss Newton was the eldest daughter of the late John Newton, Sr., who was for many years a successful woollen manufacturer and postmaster of Limehouse. She was born on lot seven, second line, Erin in 1844. Her father engaged in farming there for a few years, and then went to Limehouse, where he built his woollen mill, in which the famous Newton blankets were manufactured. Miss Newton spent three-quarters of a century there. All these years she spent at home. Being the eldest daughter she was the mainstay in the family roof-tree. She cared with loving solicitation for her mother and father in their declining years, and the younger members of the family looked to her for counsel and advice. She was a woman of superior talents and of a very likeable disposition, and while she was since a Christian. Of her four brothers and two sisters there now remain John and Isaac of Sarnia; Mrs. James Brown Acton, and Mrs. William Nickell Sarnia. All of them were in her bedside when she said adieu to this life. Her two older brothers predeceased her, William in October, 1919, and James last spring. Their deaths so closely together were keenly felt by her.
