About the By-Law

On Monday next, May 23rd, the
property owners of Georgetown
will be called upon to vote on a
By-Law to loan Marshall, Hudson
& Co. the sum of \$3000 to assist
in building and equipping a sheep-
skin-tannery in Georgetown. The
sum asked is not a large amount
It is a straight loan and the bor-
rowers pay back the principal and
interest ten annual instalments
as set forth in the By-Law. The
company will spend at least \$8000
of their own money in addition to
that borrowed from the town, on
the erection and equipment of
the plant. A first payment will
be given the town as security for
the \$3000 loan. We fail to see
where it is at all possible for the
town to lose anything as we feel
sure the security is ample. The
men connected with the enterprise
we believe to be capable and hon-
orable men who will do their part
to make a success of this new in-
dustry. They have not asked, nor
are they to receive any other con-
cessions outside the loan. Now,
not thinking the good business to sup-
port the By-Law and help keep
Georgetown moving, we are
proud of the industries we now
have, and appreciate the fact that
their location here has been in-
strumental in making Georgetown
what it is to day. Let's put an
other link in our industrial chain
on Monday next by supporting the
By-Law.

the city of Palmerston, North.
