County Council

AGRICULTURE BEING THE basic industry of the country, every advance made in the development of agricultural education is of national value. Recently several provincial universities have provided extension courses for the benefit of farmers and others. At this end the educational authorities have co-operated with farmers' organizations with highly encouraging results. In the case of Manitoba a course of lectures was given on rural economics and sociology, supplemented by special lectures on a variety of subjects appealing to other sections of the community. In Ontario also, the University of Toronto was induced to give a similar course. A noteworthy feature of the course was the taking of the students to the stockyards, the abattoirs, and other places of a practical illustrative value. It is felt that the alliance thus established between the agricultural industry and those engaged in educational work, will lead to a better understanding of economic problems which effect the welfare of town and country alike.
