County Court
The adjourned sittings of the county Court for the trial of the case, Skilton vs. Esqueving, came off last Thursday. The plaintiff claims damages from the defendant for the cutting of trees on the highway opposite his property without giving the ten days notice required by law. The trial lasted all day. The plaintiff gave evidence as to the cutting of the trees and that without notice. There were two seasons growth and some small oaks. Prof. Hutt, late of the O. C. A. Geolp, was the only other witness for the plaintiff. His evidence was that the trees were cut for the defence, to show that the cutting of the trees was necessary, as their presence on a steep slope above the roadway was detrimental to the road. They swore that three of the pines were dead. The man who got the trees from the council for removing them swore he had the pieces sawed and they yielded a little over 400 feet of lumber and about 1000 feet of wood, worth about \$5 after cutting and removal. Judgment was reserved. Counsel for plaintiff, Mr. Walsh, of Toronto; for defendant, Mr. Dale of Georgetown.
