Over 8000 People Attend Orange Demonstration in Park on July 12th.



Besides the regular life and drum accompaniment with each lodge there were the following bands in the parade:—Milton, Port Credit, Toronto, Burlington and Georgetown brass bands; Guelph, Toronto True Blues, Humber Bay, Glen Williams, five and drum bands and three Kiltie Bands.
