## The Truth

We hear a lot sometimes about the waywardness of children, and how they are getting away from their parents, but it rarely occurs to strike the people that the basis of many of our troubles is that the parents are getting away from their children. You only have to study present-day conditions to see the truth of this, for much of the sorrow in the world would not be there if parents had not allowed their children to run wild while they enjoyed themselves or were too busy in the task of making money to give the time and attention to the rearing of their offspring that their parents gave them.

Instead of less guidance there is need of more if the children are to be brought up properly. Children cannot bring themselves up any better than they could when the present-day parents were children themselves. There is even more need for parental supervision of the home to-day than there ever was, for with the advance of times, and the introduction of modern luxuries and amusements, the temptations are greater, and the chances for an unguided child going wrong are considerably enhanced. A few of the old-time methods of governing the young would be most acceptable in these days of boasted progress.

For much of the trouble the mothers are most to blame. In saying that I know the feminine sex will exclaim, "Of course he would say that." Not for a moment do I rob a man from his responsibility with regard to bringing up the children, but business life is a pretty strenuous one these days and it is a good deal easier for the father to get away with it than it is to fool mother, who sees what is going on, or ought to do so. Unfortunately, however, that is where the chief fault lies. With a lot of women it is this making and that, and call after another, with the result that they, too, fall down on the job and the result is that the children, like Topsy, just grow up the best way they are able to, with only an occasional guiding hand stretched out to direct them in the right way. First call on our care is the children, and it isn't enough that we feed and clothe them properly—that needs our guidance and direction, and it cannot be done with smiles and lollipops, either. That is why I said we need to bring back a few of the old-time methods in bringing up children, and unless the mothers give the matter greater attention it will be a serious question how far the fathers can abandon their business in order to have more time to remedy affairs—Overscorer.

## Canada's Seed Trade

During the year 1920 Canada's export seed trade made a considerable advance, owing in no small degree to the efforts of the Dominion Department of Agriculture and the Department of Trade and Commerce. The Canadian Trade Commission's supplied lists of prospective customers abroad for Canadian seed. These were communicated with and their requirements placed before Canadian exporters. In this way an increased export trade was brought about to the United States, Great Britain, France and Newfoundland. To Ireland alone approximately 100,000 bushels of fibre flax seed, worth about \$1,000,000, was exported. In British Columbia field root and garden vegetable seeds, amounting to 150,000 pounds, were marketed through the United Seed Growers, Limited, Vancouver. In Canada some 70,000 pounds of mangel, swede, turnip, and field carrot seed, grown by the Experimental Farms, were sold at current wholesale prices to farmers' organizations and individual farmers. It was deemed advisable to confine the marketing of this seed to Canada, so that farmers might have the exclusive advantage of using this high quality seed. Circulars detailing the available seed potato supplies in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec proved an important factor in relieving the shortage in Ontario. Demonstrations conducted on 172 farms in Ontario and Quebec with mangel and swede turnip seed resulted in showing the superiority of home grown seed over foreign. Seed laboratories are now maintained by the Dominion Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Calgary and at these points some 28,000 tests were carried out. Samples of wheat, oats, barley, smooth and clover were tested for vitality and at Calgary investigation was made into the effect of frost on germination.

## Notes and Comments

BECAUSE SOMEBODY SAID that somebody else said that Sunday bathing was carried to the extreme in Toronto, somebody else jumped to the conclusion that the Lord's Day Alliance was taking action to stop Sunday bathing. It now turns out that the administrative officer of the Lord's Day Alliance declares that the Alliance has no objection whatever to Sunday bathing if the proprietors are observed.

HON. MANNING DOHERTY, Ontario minister of Agriculture, has called the London office of the Ontario Government, to reserve space for an Ontario exhibit in the Imperial fruit exhibition, which takes place at London in November next. In addition, the Ontario Government will ask that space be reserved for growers and growers' Associations of the province in the competitive displays.  
The classes open to overseas apple growers are for Wealthy, Snow, McIntosh, Golden Russet, King, Spy, Blenheim, Orange, Jonathan, Cox's Orange, Pippin, Spitzenberg, Greening, Newton Pippin and Stark.

The Minister hopes that a large number of Canadian growers will take advantage of the opportunity to bring their product before the British public.

AT THE RESESSIONS of the county court in Barrie last week over which he presided, Judge Vance took occasion to remark some facts respecting motor car accidents which affect the courts. The Judge said that throughout Canada and the United States the courts were very far behind in the work of handling these cases. He pointed out that there is manifestly too much assumption on the part of drivers that if they blow their horn, everybody walking has to move out of the way. The abuse of drivers is that they think they have the right of way. But, according to the statute, said the Hon. Mr. Justice, a motor car is driving at a moderate rate of speed it has no right to assume that by merely tooting its horn it is relieved of all responsibility. The pedestrian has the same rights as the driver.

THE HEAT OF THE past few weeks has caused a great many persons who had postponed their idea of a vacation to make a start, while many others are doing some heavy thinking as to where they will go.
