WE CONGRATULATE Principal Green, his staff of teachers and the pupils themselves on the excellent showing made at the recent High School Entrance Examinations. There were 14 pupils who wrote and 14 passed; 9 of the 14 received honors. This is a record to be proud of.

WITHIN ANOTHER THREE WEEKS a little army of some forty thousand men will be speeding out to the farms on the prairie to give a hand to gathering and threshing western crops. The employment service of Canada regards this number as a reasonable estimate.

ON THE PROVISIONS of the Temperance Act and the Ban on liquor within Ontario for beverage purposes became effective and this province has become bone-dry nominally and legally.

Whether it remains so or not is for the future to decide; the real test will arise from the proper enforcement of the law. Perhaps it will come in time before the real test in this connection has been brought about, for until the considerable quantity of liquor now stored away in private cellars has been consumed, the evasions of the law will be apt to be on a much smaller scale than later on. However, the people of Ontario are a law-abiding people, and if such a law can be enforced anywhere it ought to be possible to enforce it here.

Meanwhile it will be to remember that other provinces are experimenting with different methods of dealing with the liquor problem. Quebec and British Columbia are trying out different systems of government control. In British Columbia there is a system of permits.

Perhaps it is just as well that these different methods are being tried. We may learn some experience of others as well as from our own.

Once again the Georgetown-Ball Team showed their superiority in ball when they took the Thannery middle-aged team in the game of the 28th and it was only at one period of the game that the result was at all doubtful.

One thing the spectators could not help but notice, and that is that Acton at least has showed true sportsmanship by playing their home boys; and if they should not win a game they will receive more credit than they did last season when they played in Georgetown with eight of the nine players imported from the senior ball teams of Toronto.

On Saturday next the citizens of Georgetown will receive a special treat in base ball. One of the best teams from the city has Geolph will endeavor to demonstrate that they play as good ball as this last Georgetown nine, so turn out boys and give our team a lift to another victory.
