Ontario's New Marriage Act

Arrangements are fast being completed at the Parliament Buildings for the enforcement about October 1 of the radical changes in Ontario's Marriage Act, enacted at the last session of the Legislature. On or about that date the privilege of officiating marriage ministers is to be taken out of the hands of the jewelers, who have so long held it, and vested with Municipal Clerks. And a provision, less well known, is that only duly registered clergymen of recognized denominations may legally perform the marriage ceremony.

Heads of the larger Church denominations have already sent in to the Provincial Department of Health for registration a list of their ministers throughout the Province. The imperativeness of Church boards according to registration proceedings is being emphasized by Dr. J. W. B. McCullough, who reminded the Globe yesterday that there is a penalty clause in the new amendment which provides that any minister registered and ordained by the Provincial Secretary who solemnizes or undertakes to solemnize any marriage shall incur a penalty of \$300, and also shall be liable to imprisonment for six months or exceeding twelve months.

Undoubtedly the new provisions in the act will prohibit performing the marriage ceremony by ministers outside the larger Church denominations. In past times have been permitted to officiate. Before Confederation the original Marriage Act gave ministers of all recognized denominations the right to marry. This law gave the right to the Anglicans, Baptists, Congregationalists, Jews, Methodists, Presbyterians and Roman Catholics. Since then, by act of Legislature, there have been added to the list the Salvation Army, Disciples of Christ, Farrington Independents, Society of Friends, and the Brothers. According to the general understanding of the act above mentioned, ministers of other denominations cannot comply with the registration order and cannot hereafter perform marriages. All such ministers should find out where they stand under the new act before attempting to perform the marriage ceremony.

Section 2 of the amendments passed last session gives power to the Provincial Secretary to issue to ministers of recognized denominations, on their behalf, certificates of registration, and stipulates that, where it is apparent that any person registered has ceased to possess the qualifications entitling him to be registered, he may annul such registration and revoke his authority to perform marriages.

Section 3 of the amendment, by changing the word "marriage," extends the right to perform marriages to properly ordained clergy-women. Section 4 vests with the Clerk of every city, town and incorporated village, and every Police Magistrate having jurisdiction in territory without municipal organization, the right to issue marriage licenses. Section 5 permits such duly appointed issuer to appoint deputy or deputies to act for him, a provision needed in the case of larger municipalities. Section 9 places the license fee at \$5, of which sum \$4 is to be remitted to the Provincial Treasurer and the cost of \$1 retained by the issuer or deputy issuer.

Cheaper Sugar

Less than two years ago, in the face of a world surplus in sugar, the price of sugar was forced upwards rapidly until it threatened to reach 40 cents a pound. But whatever the cause which forced the price up, it was not enough to maintain it, and the market price started to lull back downwards. It travelled so fast that it left ruin in its train. But the high prices and the higher prospects had done their work, and now the supply of sugar on hand in the United States is so great that one leading sugar authority declares no more sugar need be brought from Cuba this year.

Canadian sugar growers are in despair and so are the U.S. bankers who have advanced over \$40,000,000 on the sugar in Cuba. Now the future prices on raws in the New York exchange are well below 10 cents a pound, and granulated sugar is actually advertised in Boston at 6 cents retail. In Toronto it stands about 10 cents, but it will surely have to come down to meet the American price. Canadian householders will not long be content to pay 80 per cent more for their sugar than do their American cousins. On this falling market someone is sure to suffer but the trouble is further back in what seems like an intricate scheme to manipulate the sugar market for private gain.

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Govt. Bronze Plaques

The bronze plaque which is being sent by the Imperial Government to the best of King of arms in the Empire soldiers who died in the late war has reached Ottawa, some 30,000 of these having been received by the Department of Records, Ottawa. These will be distributed as soon as the new medal room in the Daily Building, now in the course of construction, is completed.

There will be in the neighborhood of 60,000 of these distributed in Canada. With them goes a letter from His Majesty, worded as follows:

"I join with my grateful people in sending you this memorial of a brave life given for others in the great war."

The letter is dated Buckingham Palace. With it is a scroll reading: "He whom this scroll commemorates was numbered among those who, at the call of King and Country left all that was dear to them, endured hardship, faced danger, and finally passed out of the sight of men by the path of duty and self-sacrifice, giving up their lives that others might live in freedom." Let those who come after see to it that his name be not forgotten."

The plaque is in bronze and is about six inches in diameter. It contains the inscription: "He died for freedom and peace," and the name, number and rank of the British soldier. The plaque contains British and French inscriptions. The Canadian memorial cross, which goes only to the mother or widow of the dead soldier, this goes to the next of kin and cannot be left in a will to others.
