J. H. Lane asked for an electric street light at the corner of Main and Wesleyan Streets.

Chapman & Power addressed the Council re new waterworks system giving plans and details.
Clerk was instructed to order 6 lengths 4 in. cast iron pipe, 200 lbs caulked lead and 25 lbs hemp.

Moved by McKinlay, seconded by McMillan that Georgetown Civic Holiday for 1921 be held on the first Monday of August, a very strong petition having been sent in by the merchants of the town.
Moved by (Russ), seconded by Anthony that the new waterworks system as an auxiliary to the present system be accepted and approved. A copy of the plans and specifications be sent to the provincial Board of Health for their approval, these plans and specifications having been prepared by Messrs Chapman & Power.

Obituary

JOSEPH BROWNRIDGE
One of Esquimaux's best known and most highly respected residents, in the person of Joseph Brownridge, passed away peacefully at the home of his son-in-law, W. C. Irwin, at 196 High Park Ave., Toronto, on Saturday last.

Mr. Brownridge was in his 88th year and was widely known in both old and new worlds. He inherited the old homestead and lived there 60 years. He retired and settled in Brampton, where he lived 20 years. His wife predeceased him during his residence in Brampton. As a class leader he served his home church for 15 years, and in Brampton 20 years. He also represented his circuit as a delegate in Annual Conference for 6 years.

As a farmer he was particularly fond of well-bred horses and was a capital judge of any that were good. He served as judge in his own county 23 times. He took great interest in agriculture and was a frequent prize-winner.
The infirmities of age sat lightly upon him and he confessed that he scarcely knew what it was to be sick.

He is survived by four sons and three daughters—Thomas, Elmira, N.Y., J. F. Brandon, Man., W. W. Esquimaux township, and G. C. Brownridge of Toronto, and Mrs. J. E. Gunn, Buffalo, Mrs. R. B. Irwin, Sioux City, Ia., and Mrs. W. C. Irwin of Toronto. He had 89 grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

The funeral took place on Tuesday when the remains were interred in Ashgrove Cemetery. Six grandsons acted as pall-bearers.
