Stole Auto and Express Parcel

About 1 a.m. on Wednesday morning last, Mr. Andrew McDonald, of Chinguacousy, near Terra Cotta, was awakened by his dog barking, and on looking out discovered some men pushing his car out of the lane, where they started it and headed toward Terra Cotta. Mr. McDonald phoned Bon Peteh and Fred Lyons who with himself and Frank Peteh pursued the thieves. They pleaded not guilty, and as the Crown was not ready to proceed with their case, they were remanded for a week. 
