"Leader" office, St. Catharines, Ontario, Canada. 9 Manuscript (beautifully written) on a sheet of Parchment, 17 1/2 inches x 2 1/4 inches, of which the following is a copy: In the name of God, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.—Amen. At a meeting of the Vestry of St. George's Church held May 24th, 1878, it was resolved on account of the great decay of the said church, to erect a new stone church on the same site. The corner stone of the new St. George's Church was laid on this 25th day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy eight, by George Elliot, Esq., of the Town of Guelph. The Religious Service was conducted by the Venerable William McDermott, D.D., Archbishop of the Diocese and Commissary for the Bishop of Niagara, assisted by a number of the neighboring Clergy. Her Majesty Queen Victoria of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, Defender of the Faith, being in the forty second year of her reign. His Excellency the Right Honorable the Earl of Dufferin, K.P., K.C.B., being Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada and the Hon. D. A. McDonald, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Bishop of Niagara, The Right Rev. T. B. Fuller, D.D., D.C.L., Incumbent of the Parish, the Rev. Arthur Boulton, The Church Wardens Mr. Charles Roe and John Standish Esq., M.D., and the Lay Deacons, Messrs. J. D. Matheson, T. J. Wheeler and Samuel Phillips, Architect, Wm. St. George's Church. In the course of making the additions that are now in hand, it has been found necessary to somewhat move the position of what was believed to be the Foundation Stone. Inquiry had failed to ascertain the date of the building of the church and the hope that this would reveal the desired information was realized. On taking out the stone and turning it over the initials L. D. M. appeared on the underside of the stone, with the date 1878 beneath, and under that again, a device that in heraldry would be called a cross pattee flechee, but which very probably was meant to be a shamrock leaf. To the right of the above are the numerals LX. To the right of that again, a device that in heraldry would be called a cross pattee flechee, but which very probably was meant to be a shamrock leaf. The initials L.D.M.E. are also to be found on one of the buttresses, no doubt they are initials of one of the masons who dressed the stones. On cutting out the mortar at the bottom of a rough stone box, and it was at once seen that in the scalar the desired information was at hand and that the contents were in good condition. The only thing that has suffered in the rubbing of the scolar and that has perished, it is intended to replace the stone and the deposit under, on the same spot (but a few inches farther north) and to frame the stone so as to be visible in the organ chamber. The date 1878 will be cut on the face of the stone for the information of future generations.
