## Fire Prevention

Report of Engineer who visited  
 Georgetown last week.  
 The first impressions of a fire  
 preventionist on arriving in Geo-  
 rgetown business district might be  
 termed favorable, as one is con-  
 fronted with substantial looking  
 walls of brick and stone facing the  
 main streets. But danger does  
 not always flaunt itself in the  
 open, but lurks in hidden places,  
 and for that reason is all the more  
 real, because it's presence is not  
 recognized or is not heeded. Upon  
 making inspection of the business  
 district, particularly the cellars  
 and attics and backyards, we find  
 that the citizens and property  
 holders have much to be concerned  
 about as regards fire hazards.

A few of the many undesirable  
 conditions met with are as follows:  
 basements and attics littered or  
 filled with empty boxes, crates,  
 waste paper, packing material and  
 other refuse; waste paper etc.  
 piled underneath stairways; back-  
 yards littered with paper and  
 refuse and piled high with empty  
 boxes, crates and barrels; large  
 electric irons being operated with-  
 out pilot lights being installed in  
 the circuit; poorly fitted and in-  
 suringly fastened stove pipes; exten-  
 sion electric wires hung over nails;  
 stoves and pipes set too close to  
 combustible walls without protec-  
 tion; doors pertaining to fire escape  
 doors without fittings for closing  
 or keeping closed; paper, etc. ac-  
 cumulated in areas within cellars  
 windows; holes in floors which  
 would allow coals or fire to fall  
 through to underlying basements;  
 lack of proper receptacles for oily waste  
 etc.; and worst of all, the indes-  
 criminate burning of paper and  
 refuse in unprotected open fire in  
 close proximity to wooden build-  
 ings and surrounded by the unhy-  
 gienic conditions before referred to.

It scarcely seems necessary to  
 elaborate upon the hazard of the  
 conditions above mentioned. Dis-  
 order, untidiness and accumulation  
 of combustible refuse are allies of  
 fire and the dread of firemen.  
 Where there is nothing to burn,  
 there will be no fire. Unless a  
 spark is sown in suitable soil it will  
 not develop into a bonfire.  
 In justice to those who merit it,  
 it must be said that some of the  
 citizens apparently do make an  
 honest effort to eliminate all fire  
 hazards. Is it fair that these citi-  
 zens should be exposed to the  
 hazards which are maintained by  
 the few. During my inspection I  
 was quite convinced that some  
 business men were very seriously  
 concerned about surrounding con-  
 ditions, for which they were in no

I would suggest and strongly  
 recommend that the municipality  
 of the town of Georgetown employ  
 steadily, a man with horse and  
 cart, to make regular collections  
 of refuse and ashes throughout  
 the year once a week in the resi-  
 dential districts and twice a week  
 in the business district. The ex-  
 pense entailed to the ratepayers
