### County Council

The members of the County Council had a rather busy day on August 35th. At 10 a. m. they assembled at the Dufferin Construction camp on Dundas street, where the work was inspected. The council were specially interested in the cutting through of the big hill that leads to Waterdown. A large steam shovel is used to remove the dirt, which is loaded into trucks and drawn away. On the brow of the hill, considerable rock will have to be blasted in order to cut down the grade, which will be used on the road. A large crusher, with a capacity of 1000 yards a day is being erected, which will be in operation in about 10 days. Engineer Gregg and the contractor escorted the party around, and explained the work under construction. The party then motored to the Sixteen bridge on Dundas street, which is rapidly nearing completion, where they were the guests of the McLeod Construction Co. for dinner. The bridge was also inspected and Engineer Bell was complimented on the splendid work and progress that was being made. The bridge over the ravine is 1180 feet, and consists of eight spans 108 feet long and one span 66 feet long. All the spans have been placed in position, except one which was ready to be placed. The cement floor is completed across five spans, and it is expected the bridge will be completed within a couple of weeks, but will not be open to traffic for a few weeks, as considerable grading and filling in has to be done on both sides of the bridge. Some of the party then proceeded to the seventh line in Trafalgar township, where four miles of cement road is being laid on the county provincial highway. The work is progressing rapidly on this piece of road, and the machinery and equipment used was very interesting. The road is ten feet wide, and some days over 600 feet of concrete is laid and finished.

The council arrived at Milton about four o'clock, when the regular business meeting was held. The most important business disposed of was the sale of \$100,000 worth of 6 per cent debentures to the Amelius Jarvis Co. for \$96.41. Over a dozen tenders were received, which speaks well for the credit of the county. The Halton Farmers' Club sent in a resolution asking for the resignation of Mr. J. G. Wilson, as Road Superintendent, but the Council would not consider it, the general opinion being that Mr. Wilson was quite capable, and no specific charge had been made. A resolution was passed that the resolution be filed and not considered. Mr. Moris also addressed the council in regard to cement and steel tile for culverts, but the council took no action.
