A Peel county farm hand has
discovered that a trunk is not the

weather continues he will have
some real, live cotton in a short
time, for the bolls are about to
burst.

First winter Mr. Forster secured
six cotton plants when in Louis-
burg, North Carolina, for the pur-
pose of making another experiment
with that culture in this northern
climate. They were planted on his
farm about May 10, and favored
by the warm summer days and
nights, the plants grew remark-
ably and attained a height of at
least 80 inches. Mr. Forster is
now busy showing people what
