ON MONDAY, Sept. 20th, the property owners of Georgetown will be called to vote on a By-law for the expenditure of \$50,000 to provide an additional and adequate supply of pure water for our growing town. It has long been a recognized fact that the present supply was insufficient to meet the demands of our thriving and growing municipality, and the matter has been under consideration for several years. Different sources of supply have been examined by qualified engineers, with the result that the Cleave Springs are considered the most feasible, and capable of supplying a sufficient quantity of pure spring water for our town's present needs and for years to come.

The health of the community, and the protection of life and property from fire, demand an action now being taken by our Council in presenting this By-law, and every property owner who has the interests of the town, as well as his own interests at heart, will support them in their effort by supporting the By-law on Sept. 20th.

Georgetown's future is assured if civic advancement keeps pace with private enterprise, but any lagging on the part of the municipality to supply such an important necessity as an adequate supply of pure water would retard the wheels of progress and start the pendulum of misfortune swinging in the opposite direction.

We do not believe there is a property owner in Georgetown who rightly understands the situation, that will hazard his own interests and those of the municipality by opposing the By-law.

Vote for the By-law Sept. 20th.

Town Council

Public Meeting Monday, Sept. 19th, re New Waterworks System

A special session of Council was held on Monday evening, Sept. 14th, with Reeve Dale in the chair and Councillors McMillan, McIntyre and Anthony present. Mr. Robert Hynds addressed Council on insurance on new fire truck.

The Clerk was instructed to write the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, asking that organization to co-operate with Council in Waterworks By-law meeting on Sept. 19th.

Moved by McMillan, seconded by McIntyre, that we purchase from E. J. Fox Evans an acre of land to be used as a dumping place on terms and conditions to be embodied in a contract between Mr. Evans and the Corporation of Georgetown.—Carried.

Moved by Anthony, seconded by McMillan, that the Chautauque Committee be refunded \$5.00 spent for tuning piano and putting on new castors.—Carried.

Moved by McIntyre, seconded by Anthony, that Mr. Castoll be instructed to keep the piano in order at his offer of \$3.00 per year. Also that if piano is moved from hall for any purpose a charge of \$2.00 be made exclusive of cartage.—Carried.

Moved by McIntyre, seconded by McMillan, that Mr. Foulis be asked to confer with Council at next meeting in regard to a campaign for the Motor League.—Carried.

Moved by Anthony, seconded by McIntyre, that the Clerk be instructed to advertise for tenders for re-shingling town hall with asbestos and cedar shingles. Cedar shingles to be laid on asbestos paper.—Carried.

Moved by McMillan, that the Clerk be instructed to advertise for tenders for the construction of a retaining wall on corner of King and Queen sts., according to plans and specifications drawn up by engineer Johnston, said plans and specifications can be seen at Clerk's office.—Carried.

Moved by McIntyre, seconded by McMillan, that the Clerk be instructed to advertise for tenders for the construction of cement sidewalks in the Corporation of Georgetown for the year 1921. Plans and specifications same as last year.—Carried.

Correspondence

To Ratepayers of Village of Georgetown:

DEAR SIRS.—As you all are aware a vote on by-law for increasing Georgetown water supply will be taken on Monday, Sept. 20th, 1921, and a public meeting to discuss the proposed by-law will be held on Monday evening Sept. 19th at which addresses will be delivered by Mr. Power, waterworks engineer and Mr. Daley of the Provincial Board of Health, who will explain why waterworks extension in Georgetown is necessary. I do not believe that all the citizens realize the urgent necessity of increasing our water supply and I would urge every ratepayer of the municipality to attend this meeting so that they may be fully informed as to the merits of the proposed by-law. I understand that certain ratepayers have been criticizing the by-law and several wild statements have been made which have been very misleading and absolutely contrary to facts. One statement has been made that the engineers were to receive \$8500, which is entirely untrue, as they will receive little more than one-third of the above. A special invitation is issued to opponents of the by-law to attend this public meeting and put their objections before the ratepayers. It is an easy thing to make a statement when no one is around to contradict it, but it is quite another matter to make same statement before a public meeting, but I have no doubt that any one conscientiously opposing this by-law will have strength of character enough to appear before this meeting and voice their objections.
