Notes and Comments

IT IS WRITTEN in the annals of history that the welfare of the State and its permanency must be based on the home and the family life. It is only when it is so based that the nation can endure; it is only when our ideas about the home grow out of the teachings within the home that we can most effectively conserve the nation.

BUYING WITHIN THE EMPIRE and the greater use of the national colors in business will be the policy of the members of the Retail Merchants' Association, according to resolutions passed at the annual convention last week. The first resolution stated that in the economic interest of the British Empire, as well as with the aim of preserving the unity of the Empire, buying of goods made under the British flag should be adopted wherever possible. A supplementary resolution was adopted later with the aim of making the retailer the instrument of a greater display of national colors in Canada.

INSURANCE ON PARCEL postage in Canada will come into effect on October 1, according to notice officially gazetted last week. Parcels will be accepted for insurance against loss up to \$100. The fee will be 8 cents up to \$5, 6 cents up to \$25, 12 cents up to \$50, and 30 cents for amounts exceeding \$50 and not exceeding \$100. Notice is also gazetted that, on and after October 1, the rates on letters from points outside of Canada, with the exception of places within the British Empire (the United States and Mexico (to which places the Canadian domestic rate applies), will be 10 cents for each letter weighing one ounce or less, with 5 cents for each further ounce. The rate on postcards will be 6 cents.

ALL LAST WEEK throughout Canada Postal officials were gathering information which will tell the department at Ottawa just what the service is costing the country, and if it is being carried on at a profit. Every letter, parcel and paper passing through the postoffice last week will be counted, and a record kept of it. The amount of the stamps will be recorded, in an effort to get at the exact cost of the service, also at what cost the service is supplied to other countries. Particular attention is being paid to the rural routes, in view of the demand of the carriers for increased remuneration on contracts. Information will also be gathered in Toronto, Montreal and other cities to enable Ottawa in passing upon the demand for further increases in pay for the letter carriers.

Corn Borer Spreads
Scouting work for the European corn borer in Southern Ontario by the Dominion department of agriculture is still being continued. It has been found that this insect has spread over a much larger area than was anticipated at the beginning of the season. Up to August 27, a total of 63 townships had been reported infested 36 of these have been found to be infected. This brings the total of townships quarantined up to 78.
