### Public Meeting

#### Ratepayers Endorse Action of Council re Waterworks Extension

There was a large attendance of property owners at the public meeting held in the town hall on Monday evening to discuss the Waterworks By-law which will be voted on next Monday, Sept. 20th. Councillor McIntyre, chairman of the Waterworks Committee occupied the chair, and after a few preliminary remarks which were well chosen and quite to the point, called on Major Dallyn, a representative from the Department of Public Health.

Major Dallyn explained at length the great necessity of an abundant supply of pure water in order to keep the health of the community at its best. The present system was excellent and had served its purpose but the town had outgrown it and it had come to the time when an additional supply of pure water must be secured. He approved of the quality of the proposed new supply and urged the ratemakers to support the By-law.

Mr. Chipman of Chipman & Powers, engineers, was the next speaker. He had been in communication with Georgetown Council since 1914, regarding an increased supply of water and had been thoroughly over the ground in this neighborhood. The only feasible scheme in his mind was the one proposed in the present By-law. The risk that property owners were carrying in case of fire was too great to be compared with the expenditure required for an additional and adequate amount of water. The new source of supply would yield a quantity equal to that of the present supply, about 850,000 gals. per day.

The chairman next called on Reeve Dale who went at length into the financial end of the proposed By-law. He showed how the revenue from the present system had increased and explained to the ratemakers that the water would be sold to consumers at a special price to meet debtors and interest payments on the proposed new system. Meters were being installed on the large users and an increased revenue was derived thereby. The health of the town and fire protection demanded that action be taken, and after thorough and serious consideration the Council had decided to place the matter in the hands of the ratemakers by presenting the present By-law on Monday next.

In answer to a question Reeve Dale explained that no contracts had been let but tenders for the work would be called for on the passing of the By-law.

Engineer Powers answered several questions to the satisfaction of enquiring ratemakers. Vote for the By-law.

### Obituary

#### DAVID MORROW

At the age of 81 years, David Morrow, one of Georgetown's most highly respected citizens passed away at his home here on Tuesday, Sept. 19th. Deceased was born in Caldera, Longford, Ireland, in April, 1841, and came to America on the S. S. Astoria in 1861, landing in New York where he lived for three years. He then came to Canada and after living in Stewarstown a few years moved to Georgetown where he has been a resident for over fifty years. He was a veteran and pensioner of the American Civil war, serving with the 106th N. Y. Volunteer.

He was married to Miss Elizabeth Anne Taylor who predeceased him some years ago. Of a family of five, two died in early childhood and their son, Arthur Needham died in 1919; two daughters, Florence and Laura remain. In religion he was a Methodist; in politics a conservative, a strong supporter of temperance and was always to be found on the side of right. Deceased was a gentleman of quiet but friendly disposition and a good neighbor esteemed and respected by all who knew him.

The funeral on Thursday was largely attended, the service being conducted by his pastor, Rev. Wray L. Davidson. There were many beautiful floral tributes. The pallbearers were his neighbors, Wm. Bingham, G. Bayers, G. C. Campbell, W. Cook, J. A. Thompson and J. D. Kennedy, of Hamilton. Among those who attended the funeral were:—Mrs. Arthur Morrow and Miss Marjorie Morrow, Brampton; Mrs. H. ### Dr. Anderson Unanimous Choice

#### A Big Liberal-Conservative Convention at Milton

Over two hundred delegates from the four townships of Milton attended the National Liberal-Conservative Convention held at Milton on Monday afternoon when Dr. R. H. Anderson of Milton, the sitting member, was unanimously chosen as their candidate to contest the county in the Federal election. James MacDowell of Toronto, president of the association, was chairman.

The nomination was made by George Hillier, Reeve of Oakville, and Walter Elliott, of Nassauwagony. Short speeches were made by Mayor Davis of Oakville and George W. Morley of Toronto.

On rising to speak, Dr. Anderson received a tremendous ovation. After thanking the large audience, he nominated candidate before him and his address by dealing with the leaders in Dominion politics. He took up the fiscal policy of each and compared protection, advocated by Mr. Meighen with Mr. King's monetary tariff policy.

The speaker claimed that tariff for revenue only, if carried out to its logical conclusion, meant a reversal of our whole fiscal policy. A tariff for revenue only, without any principle of protection, meant a duty on those articles which we do not and cannot produce and which are now admitted duty free. Mr. Orin's policy, he said, was frankly a Free Trade Policy.

In concluding Dr. Anderson said he believed that the people would endorse on election day the protective policy which had been in force for over forty years.

Mr. Hocken, M.P. for West Toronto, delivered a forcible and convincing speech. He showed that the home market, preserved to the people by our protective policy, was the best market for the farmer.

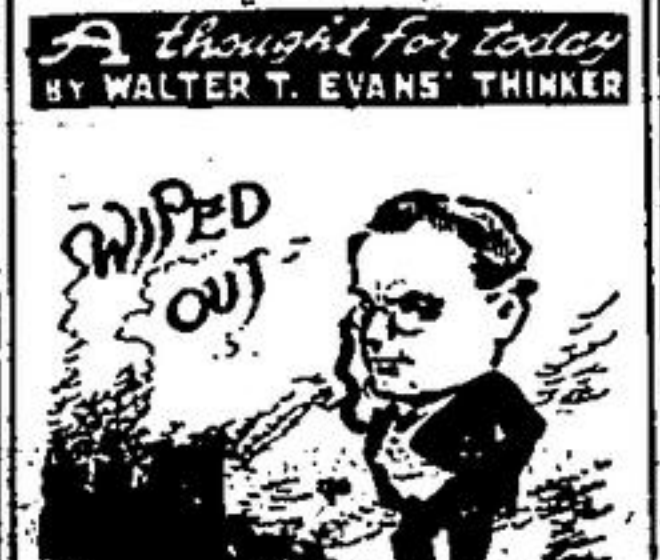
