**John F. Ford Nominated**  
By Halton People's Political Association At Big Convention  
The convention of Halton People's Political Association which was held at Milton on Monday evening, Sept. 24th, was one of the largest conventions ever held in the riding.  
Mr. Norman Wrightworth was chairman of the meeting.  
Mr. Ford was not elected as candidate without a ballot being taken. James H. Walbrook of Oakville and Harry Pettit of Freeman were nominated, and both allowed their names to go to a vote. Mr. Ford was reluctant to stand, and it was not until the ballots were about to be marked that he finally announced he was in the contest.  
He urged the delegates not to vote for him on sympathetic grounds. He did not want to be chosen just because he had given up his seat to the Premier.  
Mr. Wrightworth announced his intention of withdrawing as soon as Mr. Ford said he would run. Mr. Ford deserves the nomination; he should get it. Finally friends prevailed on Mr. Walbrook to let his name go to the convention. Two votes were taken before Mr. Ford was declared elected. On the motion of Mr. Pettit the choice was made unanimous.

Prime Minister Droux was present and received a great ovation when he entered the hall. He spoke briefly and declared his belief that the People's Political Party, Incorporated, would elect its candidate without any legalities. "While I don't intend to mix Provincial and Dominion affairs, I will do the best in my power to assist Mr. Ford in his campaign."  
Mr. Herbert Taylor, Progressive candidate for Peel County also made a short speech.
