**Anniversary Services**

Anniversary services in connection with the Methodist church were held on Sunday last. Rev. C. L. Poole, D. D. of Waterdown addressed the large audience both morning and evening. His text for the morning discourse was found in II Samuel 24: 21. "Neither will I offer burnt offerings unto the Lord my God of that which doth not cost me nothing." David in spite of his personal sin realized that blessing could come to his people only as they got back to God. If we would worship acceptably in the sight of God we must be willing to pay the price. Every spiritual blessing has its price and there are no bargains. Whenever we turn in the natural world we find that this principle is true. Nature puts a price on all her realities, in plant life, in animal life, in the realm of industry, in the field of science, or in the domain of culture, realities are only attained when the price is paid. The insured never finds his way into leadership. We enjoy one of the best systems of government in the world to day simply because our fathers realized its value and paid the price.

If we are to have a religion worth while we must pay the price. In all departments of life we have the second class and the first class. Jesus had no use for hypocrisy and camouflage. We stood for all that was sincere and real. He commended the actions of the widow who put two mites into the contribution box of Mtny who broke her box of spices on His feet because of their poverty. The price Christ paid for the world didn't begin at Calvary but at Bethlehem. All through His life He was engaged in paying the price that was complete on Calvary. If we desire to follow Christ we must follow Christ's programme, we must live His life. Canadians were not slack in paying the price for democracy, liberty, freedom in the decade that has just passed, and if we would enjoy what they fought and died for we must pay the price in good honest Christian citizenship in the land to which we belong. This price must begin in the realm of religion. We need more religion in our education, more religion in our legislation. If we do not enjoy our religion it is because we have not paid for it. A poor adulterated brand of religion is the cause of a great deal of the unrest of the present time. Religion demands the real surrender of ourselves to Christ. It means that we must follow the path Christ went. Prayer and meditation must be a large factor in each life. Sin still remains in the world, misery, crime and impurity are still common as in the days when Christ walked the fields of Judaea and Galilee. He opposed and fought every form of sin and vice. He hated the sin and loved the sinner. What is your attitude in this regard? Do you realize that we must feel the need of the world's redemption before we can work for it. To attack sin requires courage. The great blessings that we enjoy in the present were obtained only by some one in the past being brave enough and self-sacrificing enough to pay the price. If we want the Glory of Christ one of the first and absolutely essential conditions is that we bear the Cross of Christ.
