There are several excellent places for bathing, there are half a dozen different lots of public tennis courts within the city limits, there are several golf courses, and a large polo ground.

Out at Brighouse Park where teams from Vancouver and Calgary play the polo season is in full swing. Saturday afternoon nearly always finds a couple of cricket matches being played at the beautiful grounds down at Brockton Point.

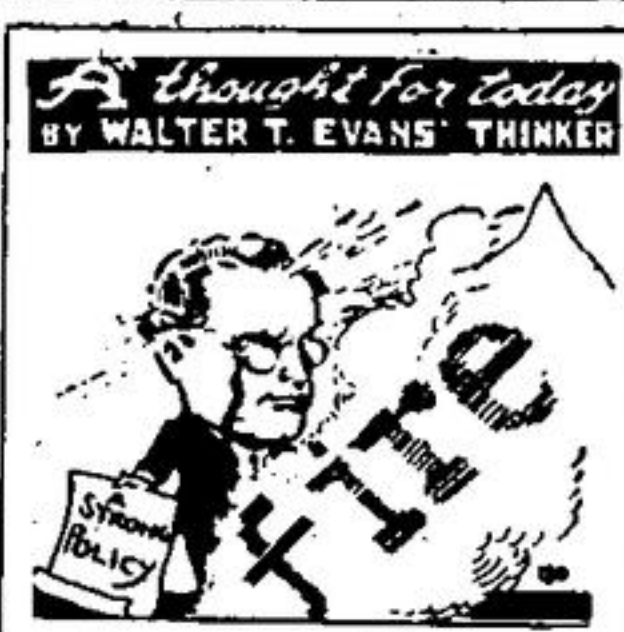
But the most popular of all amusements in Vancouver are motor-launching and yachting. The harbor down by the yacht-club is dotted with pleasure boats of every size and build; motor-power boats from the little motor launch up to the scale of the beautiful new launch from Seattle, 110 ft. built originally for submarine chaser.

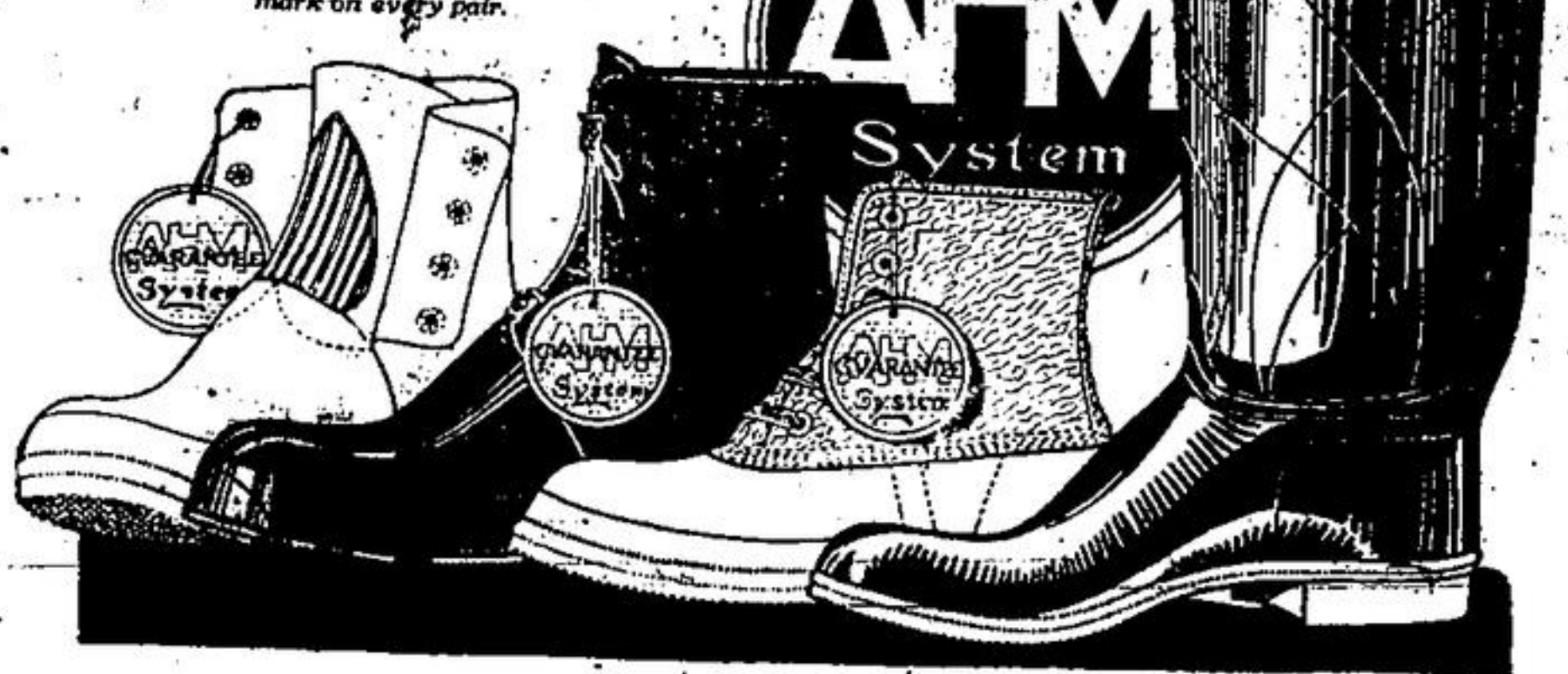

CHINA IS CHANGING

MANY OF THEIR ANCIENT CUSTOMS HAVE ALTERED.

People are still very illiterate and only a very small percentage of Chinese can read and write. Educated men have nearly all cut off their queues and adopted Western ways.

THE hot water bottle has gained quite a vogue in China. In some cities it is the latest fad. In one centre of missionary influence well-to-do Christian Chinese now come to church with a filled bottle clasped cozily against the "tummy."

In another city where a missionary university is the centre of culture, a teacher recently gave a suit of underwear to a Chinese friend. To his astonishment the next Sunday the Chinese marched proudly into the university church with this suit outside his own Chinese coat.

Awakening China is much interested in Occidental customs, and it is becoming quite the thing to make a study of the details of these for some of their own. The result is not always what they suppose. For instance, Chinese custom requires the sending of scrolls of congratulation and good wishes to the bride and groom at a wedding. Chinese affected by foreign influence have learned that we send flowers instead of scrolls, and that we send flowers for funerals also. Often they get the selection mixed and send numbers funeral wreaths for a wedding.

White is the color of mourning in China, and brides wear costumes of vermilion red, known as Chinese red. It is about the spidest thing there is. But Chinese girls educated in the mission schools follow the influence of those so educated know that in America and Europe brides wear white, so they are content to wear pink.

In Canada we have an idea that foot-binding is a thing of the past, that it and the queue went out with the Manchurian dynasty and that both are unknown under the present order. Foot-binding has practically ceased in the ports and regions most directly influenced by foreigners, and is chiefly unknown in the interior. But back in the interior only a little way the cruel practice is still indulged upon the girls of the well-to-do classes, and sometimes even on girls of the middle class, who will have to totter about at hard work on diminutive feet.

As to the queue, many Chinese are wearing it still, though few of the educated Chinese cling to it. Probably half of the coolies still wear it. It is a common practice for a rich man to wear a dilapidated foreign style straw or felt hat to bring his queue up across the top and thus tie it on securely.

Chinese coolies in controversy never come to blows, though they quarrel vociferously and gesticulate to use the fists and only claw at each other or strike out with the open hand if the quarrel becomes very serious. Sometimes one will grasp the other firmly by the queue, close to the head, and lead his whining victim away to where there is room for a good swift kick.

In our sympathy for the Chinese and our desire to see China protected against foreign aggression we are inclined to think of the Chinese as people in terms of our own. Our sympathy will be more widely directed and more helpful if we keep in mind the vast differences.

No one knows whether China has 200,000,000 people or 400,000,000. That is to say, census returns have been so inaccurate that no one can guess within a hundred million, which is approximately the total population of China.

But it is fairly well known that of this vast total, whatever it is, only about two million persons can read or write. Four hundred million is commonly accepted as the population; if that figure be accepted, there are about 200,000,000 who can neither read nor write. Many years will be required to extend education little by little to this vast mass of illiterates.

China is not much governed by laws. Customs generally control. Though these customs, when based up with superstitions and religious practices, are often hampering and prevent progress, in the main they are based on fundamental justice and the rights of the individual. The family is the outstanding institution, and customs are most generally enforced by the family, and after the family by the guild. In the family the father is the head, with undoubted authority over children and grandchildren and attached relations. But if the wife survives him, a venerable wife only lastly, she wields undoubted authority, strange to us, in this land where in other relations woman counts for no little.

A Wonderful Antique.

The birthdays of Mr. George H. Ham, of the C. P. R., have for many years past been observed by some function or other. If it was not a home-like dinner with a score or so of close friends, or a public banquet or a presentation, or an operation in a hospital, or a trip on a railway train, it was something else. This year a radical departure is being made from the ordinary August 23rd proceedings with the Munson Book Company of Toronto as sponsors for the innovation. On that day, this publishing company is issuing "Re-miniscences of a Railroader," the author of which is Mr. Ham. 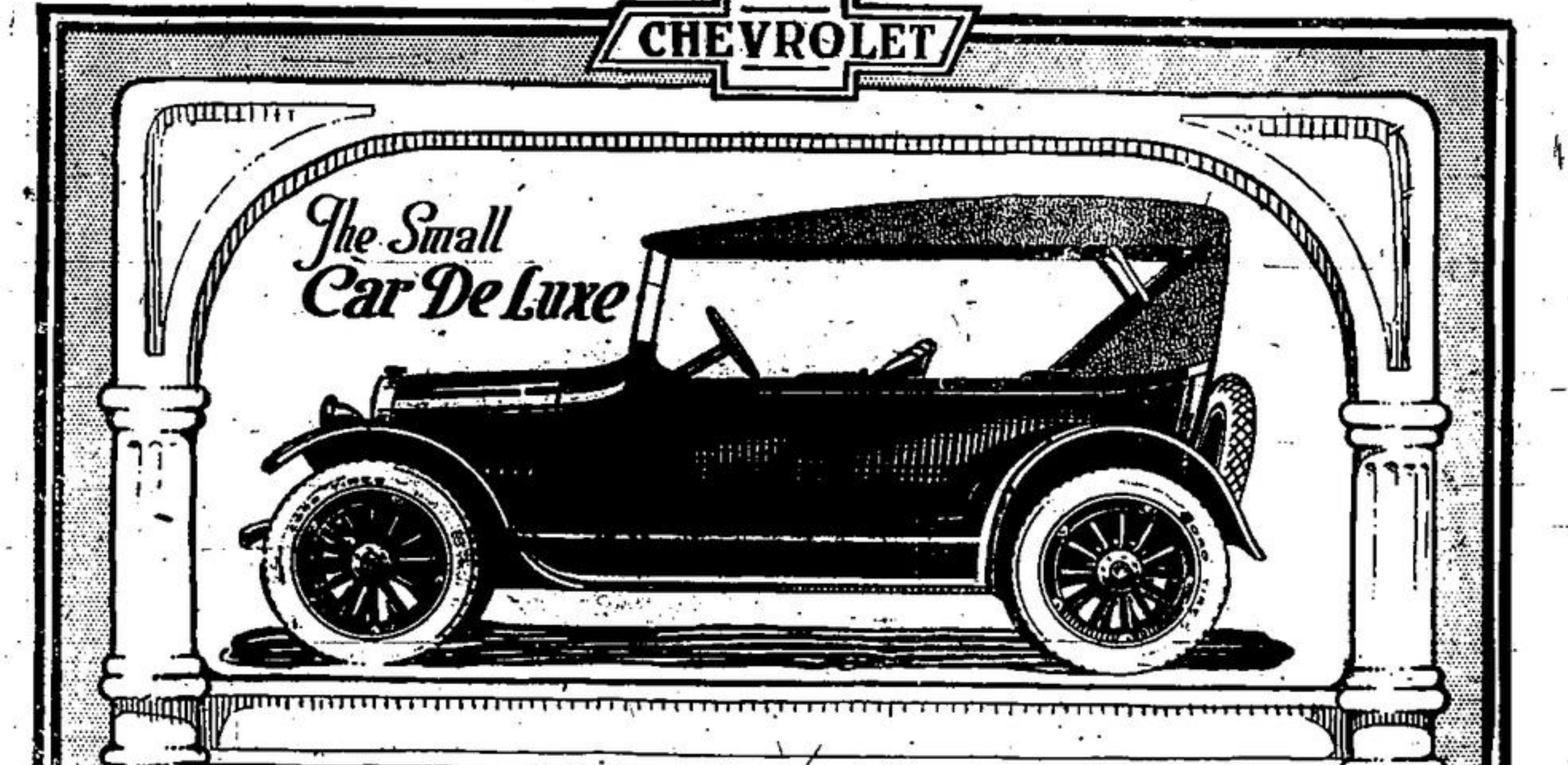
