AT A CONFERENCE of the Rit-
cher police commission, acting
Chief Graner and thirteen repre-
sentatives of the banks on Tuesday

Premier Meighen Spoke at Milton

Over 1500 heard the Premier
in an Able Address

The large skating rink at Milton,
with a seating capacity of over
1,600, was crowded last Saturday
afternoon on the occasion of
Premier Arthur Meighen's visit to
the County town.

The gathering included rep-
resentatives from Halton, Peel,
Wentworth and Wellington Coun-
ties, Halton, of course, predomi-
nating. Many ladies were in the
audience, Georgetown being lar-
gely represented by both sex.

Premier Meighen talked briefly
to a gathering of school children
in the park at Milton before pro-
ceeding to his speaking in the rink,
which was decorated with ever-
greens, flags and bunting. He
was given a civic welcome by the
Municipal Council, headed by
Mayor Earle.

The councillor James McDe-
witt of Alburgh was the chairman
of the meeting and after a few
well chosen introductory remarks,
called on Dr. Anderson, the Lib-
eral Conservative candidate for Hal-
ton, who addressed the audience
at some length on the questions
at issue. Dr. Anderson was fol-
lowed by Hon. Edmund Bristol,
after which the chairman intro-
duced the Premier.

Premier Meighen on rising to
speak was greeted with loud ap-
plause. In his opening remarks
he paid high tribute to Halton's
former representative, the Hon.
David Henderson, whom he had
known and respected for many
years. He delivered an able ad-
dress in which he reviewed the
issues before the electors, criticiz-
ed the policies of the Liberal and
Progressive leaders and pointed
out the injurious effect free
trade would have on the future
progress of the Dominion. Farm-
er, laborer and manufacturer alike
would suffer and Canada would
become flooded with the over-
production from other countries.
He urged all to stand by the policy
that had made Canada what it is
to-day and which assured future
prosperity.
